The balance of the sum allocated to the County for the purpose will go to reduce the rates by a sum equal to 39.5 pence in the £ on the part of the valuation above £20 that does not otherwise get relief.

A Money-making Proposition.

The late Dr. M. F. Moloney, a distinguished Dungarvan man of worthy honoured memory, published a treatise on herbs and their medicinal virtues. Due to the war, the manufacturing chemists who supply our needs here in Ireland cannot now get their requirements of herbs from the continent, and herbs-gathering has, in consequence, assumed a new importance. The content supplies 70 per cent of our needs, and the only way to make good the deficiency is for more people to become interested in the collection of medicinal herbs. A statement just issued by the National Agricultural and Industrial Development Association directs attention to the possibilities of a lucrative trade in herbs, barks, berries, flowers and leaves, for medicinal purposes. The A.I.D.A. can supply a pamphlet showing over 200 kinds of herbs, leaves, etc., with current market prices. In addition this pamphlet contains full particulars on when and how to pick, and general information on the treatment required. As examples it is indicated that there is cattle food in thins and tobacco substitute in leaves. Herb-gathering is a lucrative occupation already £15,000 in wages is distributed each year to those engaged in it.
