The total sum payable in respect of Poor Rate by the occupier of agricultural land, the rateable valuation of which does not exceed £20, will be reduced by a sum equal to 74.6 pence in the £ on said land. A similar allowance will be made on the first £20 of agricultural land exceeding 20 valuation.

On the part of the valuation of agricultural land above £20 a reduction will be given at the Primary Allowance Rate of 74.6 pence in the £ on an amount not exceeding £12 10s. 0d. valuation in respect of employment of a male person (17 to 70 years of age) in the period 1st January to 31st December, 1941, where claims have been lodged on or before 31st March, 1942, and admitted.

The balance of the sum allocated to the County for the purpose will be reduced by a sum equal to 39.5 pence in the £ on the part of valuation above £20 that does not otherwise get relief.

The Rate Books are now in my custody, and may be inspected by any person interested thereby at the Council Offices between the hours of 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. (Saturdays, 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.), exclusive of Sundays and Bank Holidays. The said Rates will be payable from and after the publication of this Notice.

Death of Horse Trainer. The Inquest. Mr. T. C. Williams, acting Coroner for West Waterford, held an inquest in the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on Friday last into the circumstances of the death of Mr. John Sheehan, a native of Carrick-on-Suir, who was killed by a young horse which he was training at Ballinamuck on 25th May.

The following jury were sworn: Messrs. J. J. Crotty, Square (foreman), T. O'Mahoney, Shandon; Mr. Walsh, Mary Street; Mr. E. Spratt, St. Mary's Street; Mr. J. Walsh, St. Mary's Street; Mr. J. Walsh, represented the State; Michael O'Keefe, Bohadown; and Dr. D. McCarthy, Bohadown. When the jury retired on Thursday evening, they were removed to the residence of Mr. J. Curran, Ballinamuck, about 50 yards from the residence of the deceased.

The animal seemed to witness to be two or possibly three years old. Guard Enright gave evidence of identification, and said the deceased, John Sheehan, was a native of Carrick-on-Suir, aged about forty, and single. Dr. D. McCarthy said the deceased was admitted to the District Hospital on May 25th, suffering from severe head injuries, including extensive fracture of the base of the skull. He was profoundly unconscious and the right side of his body was paralysed. The brain was protruding through the fractured bone. He died on June 2nd, and the cause of death was laceration of the brain and meningitis resulting from his injuries.

To Supt. Walsh - The injuries would be consistent with the evidence given by O'Keefe. The jury, without retiring, returned a verdict that John Sheehan died on June 2nd from laceration of the brain and meningitis, resulting from a kick from a horse, received accidentally.

The Coroner, expressing a vote of sympathy with the relatives of the deceased, said he had heard that the money expended during the summer months was a most exemplary manner. The expression of regret was joined in by Supt. Walsh, Dr. McCarthy, and Mr. J. J. Crotty on behalf of the jury.
