The bonds of friendship between Ireland and the United States of America are so numerous that the Irish people will learn with interest students in these universities and colleges in 1920 numbered 33,798, a figure which has increased to 162,000 Twenty years ago there were 130 of these institutions; now there are nearly 200. Further evidence of the growth of the Church in the U.S.A. if has passed between Monsignor I Keegan, New York, and the mayor of that city, Mr. La Guardia. The mon signor wrote to the mayor to explain to him the facilities of the Catholic charities of the New York Arch diocese, "ready to your hand in the task facing you as head of the civilian defence for the City of New York."
The mayor thanked the monsignor for his kind offer of co-operation and told him that the city would avail of it. Catholic charities, with more than 200 co-operating agencies in the arch-diocese, include 15 general and 12 special hospitals, 35 health instituions, including convalescent homes 65 institutions for family care; 67 child welfare agencies; 31 organisations for dealing with youth, providing athletic, cultural, spiritual and MONUMENTS IN MARBLE, LIME. social programmes for some 140,000 young people in town and country.
The latter work will be particularly noted in Ireland, where a new move ment to instruct and train youth is about to be put into operation. In several ways the home front, as it is called, is doubly important in time of war. It requires constant watching.

The training of youth along appro-priate lines is certainly one of the

vital problems of the present time.


