MINISTER ON WASTE PAPER SUPPLIES

The commencement of a nation-wide campaign for the collection of waste paper, and the making of an Order under which it will be an offence to destroy waste paper, were announced by Mr. Lemass, Minister for Supplies, in a broadcast during

Imports of paper used for publication of newspapers had ceased for a considerable time, he said, and have to cease publication in the very near future unless their meagre stocks could be replenished.

In all other classes of paper this country was only getting 16 p.c. of requirements, and there, was no certainty that this reduced import could be maintained. The position regarding cardboard was also serious, present imports being only serious, present imports being only 5 p.c. of what was needed.
