Sympathy Voted—At a special meeting of the Sluagh GAA Football Club, a vote of sympathy was passed to the Power family, Doon on the death of their father.

Death of Mr. M. Parks—A melancholy surprise was occasioned throughout the County when the news of the death of Mr. M. Parks, Ballyduff, Dungarvan, became known. Frank O'Brien (brother) returned on Friday evening of last week, is rendered all the more poignant by the tragically sudden circumstances which surrounded it. Deceased enjoyed the goodwill and respect of the many who knew him throughout the County. In fact, it is an exaggeration to say that the late Mr. Parks was persona grata with all sections of the whole wide community. A progressive, industrious gentleman, he was for a long number of years one of the ablest members of the Dungarvan Rural District Council and Board of Guardians and his knowledge of Local Government administrative was extensive. He was father of Sister M. Ursula, Convent of the Holy Rosary, Killeshandra, Co. Cavan; Miss Pauline Parks, N.T., Tramore; Una N. Parks, O.S., An Rinn; Miss Ester Parks, Civil Service, Parkgate, Dublin; Mr. Richard Parks, B.Agr. Sc., Ennisceorthy; Mr.

Dungarvan District Court.

Held on Tuesday last before Mr. Troy, D.J.

Civil Bills—A number of civil bills and applications for examination orders were before the court and the usual orders were made thereon.

Ejectment Civil Bill—Mr. Kenny, sol., on behalf of Mr. P. A. Usher, Cappagh, applied for an ejectment order against Mr. O'Neill, Cappagh. Mr. Holmes, manager and steward for Mr. Usher, gave evidence of the amount of rent due up to July 1st, 1942, viz. 64 sh. The tenancy is a quarterly one at 21 sh. per quarter. The Justice questioned whether his court had any jurisdiction in this case.

Mr. Kenny asked for an adjournment which was granted.

Enforcement of Hours—Mr. Liam F. Lanigan, solicitor, applied for and was granted an extension of the licensing hours on behalf of the Dungarvan Golf Club for Sunday, August 30th, and Sunday, September 6th. The applications were granted.

Drunk—Sergt. Teahan prosecuted Thos. Anglin, Ballinacorney, with being drunk and incapable on the public street. A fine of 2/6 was imposed.

Lights—Guard Enright charged the following under the Lights on Vehicles Act, 1928: Salline, Salline, muck, 3/6; John Burke, Clonea, 5/-; John Flynn, do., 5/-; Lena Wall, Dungarvan, 5/-.

Cross and Cross Summons—The following summons were called by Mr. P. O'Keefe, Court Clerk at the bar: Mr. P. O'Keefe, Court Clerk for assault on her child. Same v. Nora Attridge for damage to a donkey, her property. Mary Attridge v. M. and Pk. Nagle, damage to ornamental tree and rose bushes. Nora Attridge v. Pk. Nagle, abusive and threatening language.

Mr. Lanigan, sol., who appeared for the Nagle family, asked for an adjournment, as one of his clients, Patrick Nagle, had been called to Waterford to visit an uncle who was ill.

Mr. Morrissey, sol., who represented the Attridge family, said he had a telephone message to that effect from Mr. Lanigan last morning. However, his own client had informed him that she had seen Nagle outside his own house ten minutes ago. He (Mr. Morrissey) submitted that Nagle, who was due to go to England, waived this adjournment so that he would appear in the court of the jurisdiction of the Court.

The Justice decided to hear the case.

Replying to Mr. Lanigan, Mrs. Nagle said she saw Mrs. Attridge beating witness's son on 6th August.

Replying to Mr. Morrissey, she swore that she saw Mrs. Attridge beating her child. She saw Nora Attridge strike her donkey with a brush in the eve. She did not hit the donkey because of its being in Attridge's garden; it was not in the garden eating her roses.

Mr. Morrissey questioned the witness as to the ownership of the donkey which was stated in the summons to be her property. She admitted the donkey was the property of her husband.

The Justice accordingly dismissed this case.

A son of the last witness deposed that Mrs. Attridge hit him with her hand as he was taking the traces off the car. She tore the sleeve of his jersey.

Mr. Morrissey—No one saw her striking him. He did not break an ornamental tree.

After evidence was given by the Misses Mary and Nora Attridge, the case by Mrs. Nagle against Mary Attridge was dismissed on the merits with 10/- costs. A like order was made in the case, Mrs. Nagle v. Nora Attridge. In the case, Mary Attridge v. M. and Patrick Nagle, the Justice convicted and fined the defendants 2/6 with 3/- compensation and 20/- costs to be paid within 3 clear days or in default seven days imprisonment. In the case of Nora Attridge v. Pk. Nagle for abusive and threatening language, defendant was ordered to enter into recognisance himself in £10 and two sureties of £5 each to be of good behaviour for 12 months or in default two months hard labour.

The Justice said he would issue a second and last warrant to the defendant, if any of them don't conduct themselves after this they will be very sorry for themselves later.

County Board of Public Assistance.

Mr. T. D. Connolly, Chairman, presided at the monthly meeting of the above on Monday last, other members in attendance were Messrs J. P. Cosgrave, Paul Cuffinell, James Power, Bryan Cunningham and Commissioner S. J. Moynihan. Mr. M. Flynn, Secretary; Mrs. P. A. Croika, Assistant Secretary, and Mr. M. Phelan, Superintendent Assistance Officer, were also in attendance.

Financial Statement—The monthly financial statement showed a deficit balance of £22-10-11d.

The Department wrote stating that in connection with the appointment of nurse instructor and night superintendent, it was proposed by the Board on 17th inst. each nurse would have to do alternative custody night duty for 12 months.

The Department also directed attention to the difficulty of getting suitable candidates for the post of night superintendent. It was stated that there would be much more difficulty in getting two suitable candidates than one.

Mr. Cosgrave—What happens if we don't approve of the course suggested by the Minister?

Secretary—We will have to wait for future developments.

Emergency Medical Supplies—A letter from the Department of Defence notified the Board that the Board of Health as governing body for the medical supplies stored in the Co. Infirmary, Waterford, and in the District Hospital, Dungarvan, is responsible for the safe custody of these supplies and for their storage. The Board should take any steps necessary to comply with the enclosed instructions. The letter was noted.

Increase—The Superior, Children's Hospital, wrote notifying the Board of increased charges in maintenance of from 3/- to 4/6 per day, as from 1st Sept.

Home Assistance—The Superintendent Assistance Officer reported the amount of Home Assistance paid out during the month was £1,645 10s. 9d. for the preceding month the amount was £1,613 3/10d. and for the corresponding period last year, £1,684 4s. 3d.

Failure to contribute to Family—A report from the Board's solicitor stated that Thomas Preston, who was brought from England and charged with failing to maintain his wife and family, was sentenced to one month's imprisonment.

Application for Second Dispensary—Arising out of the resolution passed at the previous meeting asking for the establishment of a second dispensary in Waterford, a letter was read from the Department asking the Board to state the reasons for the proposal.

The Board decided to ask the medical officers for their views thereon.

CO. COUNCIL ELECTION

The electorate of the rural areas in the County Waterford showed much apathy in the matter of exercising the franchise on Wednesday, 19th inst. as out of a total electorate (including the Urban District of Dungarvan) of 31,483 only 12,856 recorded votes, or roughly 40.9 per cent.

The County being divided into four electoral areas, we give hereunder the voting strength of each area; the number of valid votes recorded in each area as follows:—Dungarvan: voting strength, 9231; valid votes, 4,615; Kilmacthomas, 7385; valid votes, 2,812; Tramore, 8,434; valid votes, 2,646.

The number of spoiled papers in each area were: Dungarvan, 242; Kilmacthomas, 88; Lismore, 71; Tramore, 60.

The following were the first preference votes received by the candidates in each area:—Dungarvan (7 seats): total valid poll, 4,615; quota, 587. Tributes to Returning Officer.
Proposing a vote of thanks to the Returning Officer, Senator Butler, (Fine Gael) said that speaking for himself and also for the other candidates and members of his party, Mr. Boyle had treated everyone, the candidates, the agents and everyone connected with the election with the greatest courtesy and fairness. Before the Poll, during the Count and up to the present moment, no doubt the conduct of this election reflects the greatest credit on Mr. Tommy Boyle and the staff he had selected. They have given everyone complete satisfaction; they had pleased everyone and they had exercised the greatest tact and care in the Count. He, therefore, wished to express his appreciation of Mr. Tommy Boyle; he could not find words enough to say what he would like to say of the conduct of the Count, but he hoped that in years to come they would still have the same Returning Officer and the same staff and he knew that the candidates would get the same careful care as in this election. Referring to the Co. Council just elected, Mr. Butler said that a new system would be in operation. This would

not be like the old system, but it is only fair that the new system, which would be, as it were an experiment, would get a fair trial in the May election. It would not. They would have to judge that for themselves. The new system may be alright in theory, in practice it might be wrong and after 12 months of it, it might be found necessary to have the old system back. It can be given a fair trial in the election and the County and the new Co. Council after having experience of it, can give their verdict one way or the other. Concluding, Senator Butler reiterated his thanks to the Returning Officer (applause).

Mr. M. Morrissey, T.D. (Fianna Fail), seconding the proposition endorsed the remarks of appreciation passed by the proposer and said they were fortunate in having such an excellent Returning Officer and staff. He said he would also like to express his appreciation of the work done by the body members of the staff. On the whole, conduct of the election Mr. Boyle had been an outstanding Returning Officer, and the greatest praise was due to him and to his staff.

On behalf of the party he represented, he was greatly pleased with the result of the election. It was gratifying to see from the figures that the Fianna Fail party had polled 5,028 votes out of a total poll of 12,856. This was the highest poll of any party in the election and to him and the party he represented it was very gratifying. The Fianna Fail party also had the largest representation in the Council. There could be no doubt about it but the people of Waterford, as the results showed, seemed to be in the presence of Government and were prepared to support the party in power.

Referring to the constitution of the new Council, Mr. Morrissey said the people of Waterford had made a good selection, and he hoped the Council would reflect the desire of the electorate to co-operate with the Manager appointed for the County. He was confident the new Council would do so. The people, he believed, wished to co-operate with the Central Authority and with the Central Authority's appointed manager. He believed that if there was full co-operation, the new system which was going to be introduced would be very beneficial to the country as a whole. Without co-operation with the Central Authority it would be no good. Co-operation was very much needed in the present time when this country was going through such a trying time. That co-operation should be above any party politics and he was satisfied that the new Council would do that co-operation. From his knowledge of the new members he was sure that they would give of their best in helping to get the country over the very difficult and trying period through which they were passing, especially:

Mr. Thomas McCarthy (Labour), on behalf of his party said that he wished to say a few words on the vote of thanks to the Returning Officer and his staff.

Mr. Commissioner S. J. Moynihan also associated himself with the vote of thanks to the Returning Officer and staff and said he felt sure that an excellent Co. Council had been elected in Waterford. Continuing, Commissioner Moynihan said that if any emergency should arise and they could never tell when or how it would arise, it was essential that the people should have a body they could rely on in the county. He believes that the people of Waterford had just elected a body of men that would do their duty; if the country became involved in war, which he sincerely hoped would never happen—it was the Local Bodies such as this that they would have to fall back on to direct them in certain matters that a war situation might bring about.

Mr. T. B. Boyle, Returning Officer, on behalf of himself and his staff thanked the various speakers for their very kind remarks which he and the members of the staff appreciated deeply. He also wished to thank his staff, especially Mr. Supt. O'Mahoney and the Garda for their wonderful help and courtesy all through the election.

NOTE—Some idea of the magnitude of the task undertaken by the Returning Officer at this election may be gauged from the fact that a total of 85 ballot boxes had to be opened and checked and that before the last man was declared elected, 51 counts had taken place.
