REPORT ON EXPLORATORY WORK. Messrs. Delap and Waller, Consulting Engineers, had a very extended report before the meeting on the progress of the exploratory work at Deahill. Some of the main points were: Work started on October 8th, and covered inspection of tunnel, marking and raking out major cracks together with inspection holes in the floor. The work of raking and caulking being slow owing to the confined space. River examined for springs but none found other than those known.
