LISMORE NOTES.
LATE Mr. T. F. O'SHEA.
Since regret has been occasioned
throughout the county by the death
of Mr. Timothy Edward O'Shea,
M.C.C. T.C., who died peacefully
suddenly at his apartments in Chapel
Street, on Wednesday 17th inst., Mr.
O'Shea had attended a meeting of the
County Council on Tuesday and ap-
peared in his usual health on retiring
that night, so the news of his passing
came as a great shock to all members
of the Waterford Co. Council to
which he was elected last year and
also to the Lismore Town Commis-
sioners, of which he was also a
member. Mr. O'Shea had at various
times been closely connected with
the administrative affairs of the town
and county, having formerly spent about
four years as a Co. Councillor until
forced to retire owing to ill-health.
He was, also, for a number of years
chairman of the Lismore branch of
the Irish Transport and General
Workers Union. During his terms
of office, having formerly been a
conscientious and careful attention to
his duties gained for him the greatest
respect and esteem. Belonging to a
well-known local family, deceased
was brother to the late Very Rev.
John O'Shea, P.P. Ballyporeen, and
to the late Mr. Ed. O'Shea, the
famous Irish tenor who won world-
wide renown with the famous Carl
Rosa Opera Co. Mr. O'Shea, him-
self, was a no less talented singer
but could never be prevailed upon to
perform in public. In his early days
he travelled extensively, spending
about ten years in the merchant navy,
during which time he visited almost
every port in the world and he had
many a thrilling tale to tell of his
perceptions in foreign parts. In this
sphere, Mr. O'Shea's abilities won him
him rapid promotion and he was
about to qualify as captain when he
was obliged to leave the service and
return to his native land. His life was
characterised by a deep love of his
Motherland and a point by D.

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MR. MICHL MASON,
CAPPOQUIN.
REGRETTED PASSING OF AN
OLD GAELE.
It is with feelings of deepest
sympathy that we record the death of
Mr. Michael Mason, Main St., Cappoquin,
which occurred at his residence
on Friday night, 17th February.
Apparently in the best of health dur-
ing the day, he went around as usual
and little did we think he would be
called so soon to the land from
whence no traveller returns. Late on
Friday night, when himself and the
members of his family had finished
saying the Rosary—a beautiful Irish
custom which he carried out regu-
larly each night, he was seen to slide
from the chair against which he was
kneeling and fall to the floor. His
loving wife was awe-stricken and
quickly ran to the door to summon
assistance. Two members of the De-
fence Forces having heard her cries
came immediately to her aid, but
before the priest and doctor, but
poor Mick was beyond all earthly
assistance, having passed away to his
eternal reward before the end.
A man of outspoken principles, he
said what he thought and never
pondered when truth and straight-
forwardness were in the balance. His
genial personality was part of the
Cornerstone town, where he was the
proprietor of Mason's for many years.
Possessed of a natural gift
of gentle, cheery kindness, he com-
manded the esteem and confidence of
all who knew him to the end, he
was a devout Catholic and regularly
attended Mass each morning in St.
Mary's Church.

Sympathy.—The deepest sympathy
of the Division is extended to the
family of the late Mr. Michael Mason,
Cappoquin, on his recent tragic death.
Mick, as he was known to us all, was
an ardent member of the Light of
the Cappoquin Bowling Club, and up
to the last maintained the highest
standards of a member of the club.
He was also on the Race Com-
mittee when the point-to-point fixture
was held in Ballynoe course.
Perhaps the most remembered
for the work he had done for the local
G.A.A. Club. He was Chairman of
the body for a long number of years,
and his brother Joe and himself were
in the front line of the Light of
Hurling and Football Club—organised
collections, forty-five drives, settled
party disputes, etc. It is due largely
to the efforts of the late Mr. Mason
and his brother Joe and himself that
the club has been able to re-possess the
Sportsfield.

a few of the admirable traits of char-
acter possessed by this model Catho-
lic and neighbour. During her illness
she was assisted by the Rev. E. English,
P.P., Stradally, and Rev. J. Lawn, C.C.,
Kilmacross, and Nurse E. Finn, English-
town, do, and her death was a truly
heavy loss to her family and friends.
Her remains were interred in the
Holy Sepulchre at the Light of
Heaven to her soul. Sympathy with
the bereaved ones is universal. A
remarkably large and representative
attendance was present at the funeral
on Sunday evening to St. Bridget's
Parish Church, Kilmacross, where
they were rested overnight on
the graveside before the High Altar.
On Monday, after Requiem Mass
had been offered for the happy repose
of her soul, the remains were borne
from the sacred edifice to her last
resting-place in the adjoining cem-
tery by her four nephews, Messrs.
John, Robert, Laurence and Matthew
Lynch, of Ballykerogue, Stradally,
Very Rev. J. Crotty, P.P., Kilmacross,
pronounced the final absolution
for the repose of her soul. A number
of beautiful floral wreaths were placed
on the grave, and sheaves of Mass
cards and messages of condolence
were received. The chief mourners
included: Mr. M. Lenihan (husband);
Mrs. M. Lynch, Ballykerogue;
Mrs. M. Lynch, Kilmacross; Mrs.
Misses Vouden and Barron,
(relatives). Two brothers and two
sisters of deceased are domiciled in
the U.S.A. (American newspapers

INQUEST AT CLASH-
MORE.
"DEATH FROM NATURAL
CAUSES."
In the Garda Station, Clashmore,
on Friday last, 19th inst., Dr. Mc-
Carthy, Coroner, conducted an in-
quest into the circumstances of the
death of Declan O'Neill, 72, farmer,
Toor, Mountstuart. The following
jury were sworn: Messrs. Thomas
O'Connell (foreman), John Broderick,
Matthew Collins, John Fender, Pat-
rick O'Donoghue, Patrick Cunningham,
Thomas O'Connell, Jr., and Charles
Curran.

Supt. O'Mahony, Dungarvan, and
Inspector McConigle represented the
authorities, and also present were
Sergt. W. J. Gillis, Sergt. Murphy,
Garda P. J. Ryan, Garda J. O'Dea,
D.-O. Barry, D.-O. Small, etc.

Dr. J. McGrath, State Pathologist,
deposed that he had conducted a post
mortem examination on the body of
Declan O'Neill, which he had seen
removed from a coffin, and found that
the bridge of deceased's nose was
fractured, and there were also other
facial injuries and a scratch on the
lobe of the left ear and scratches on
one of his knees. The brain was normal.
The heart was dilated and
enlarged. There was a rupture of the
iliac aneurism and extensive internal
hemorrhage resulting therefrom.
Death was due to natural causes—
cardiac failure caused by haemorrhage
from a ruptured artery.

Dr. James F. Ronayne, Clashmore,
said he assisted Dr. McGrath in
carrying out the examination on the
body of Declan O'Neill, and agreed
with him as to the cause of death.

James Mahony deposed that his
wife and himself had resided with
deceased. He was in his usual good
health on Monday, 15th Feb., but
shortly after he (O'Neill) had retired
to bed they heard him moaning and
went to his room to find him in a
weakness. They sent for his (de-
ceased's) nephew, who went to Clash-
more for a priest. After the depart-
ure of the priest O'Neill got out of
bed and fell in his room and sustained
some cuts. His nephew came and
assisted him (Mahony) to put O'Neill
back to bed. O'Neill died on Tuesday
morning, 18th Feb.
