## BOXING IN DUNGARVAN.

Under the auspices of the Dunganvaran L.D.F. Boxing Club, a very successful tournament was staged in the Town Hall on Friday night last. The bouts, with few exceptions, were keenly contested as to please the most critical. The receptions were in the Feather and Heavyweight contests; in the former the contest lasted between Sergt. Dunne of the 21st Batt. (and brigade champion, 1943) and M. Morrissey, Waterford B.C. In this contest the referee, in the 1st round, ordered the men to make a fight of it. This not having the desired effect, the referee again stopped the fight and said that unless the men made a fight of it he would disqualify both. In the Heavyweight contest, M. McInerney, Dunganvaran B.C., was to meet Cpl. R. Galvin, 46th Batt., but the latter failed to appear in appearance, and was substituted by J. Hurley, Waterford B.C., who went down on one knee in the first minute of the first round for the count. Apart from the above, the 11 other fights were needle affairs and gave the audience full value for their money.

The programme opened with two contests for boys of three 1 1/2 minute rounds. The first between Carleton and J. Hurley, of the Dunganvaran Club, and Joe Cronin and Ted Sullivan, of the same club. The first-named in each case was declared the winner.

**Bantam Weight**—D. Murphy and P. Whelan, of the Dunganvaran B.C., gave a spirited display over four 2-minute rounds. In this, the decision going to the former on the smallest of margins.

In this grade also a real tit-bit was served up in the four 2-minute contest between Pte. O'Brien, 21st Batt. (brigade champion, 1943), and John Dwyer, Dunganvaran B.C. This was a most scientifically boxed contest, and for the first three rounds the men were even; in the fourth round the lack of training told on Dwyer who got a great ovation as a game loser.

**Pte. O'Brien, 13th Batt., and Tpr. Smallhorn, 1st Motor Squadron**, also served up some good boxing. It was a clash of styles. O'Brien, an outstanding, straight hitting boxer who packed a grand left hook. Smallhorn, on the other hand, was of the weaving, ducking style. The verdict went to O'Brien.

**Featherweight**—This was the fight (already dealt with) in which the referee cautioned both boxers. The crowd also signified their disapproval.

**Lightweight**—P. Crotty and J. Dunne, of the Dunganvaran B.C., served up a real tit-bit of honest-to-goodness fighting in this grade, in which Dunne was outpointed. Crotty got in some telling straight lefts which forced Dunne to the ropes several times in the first round. In the second round Dunne began with a whirlwind attack, which, however, Crotty weathered well and, taking the initiative, he had his opponent in difficulties when the gong sounded. In the third round Crotty scored with lefts and rights to the head and body which had Dunne grumpy, and so save him from further punishment his second round in the lower.

The second Lightweight contest, between Pte. Finlay, 13th Batt. (runner-up brigade champion, 1943) and Tpr. Derivan, 1st Motor Squadron (brigade champion, 1943) was a thrill all the way through, both men showing boxing of a high order. The verdict, in favour of Finlay, which must have been by a very small margin, got a mixed reception from the audience.

**Welterweight**—Pte. Saunders, 21st Batt. (and runner-up brigade champion, 1943) got the verdict over K. Ryan, of the Waterford B.C., in a four 2-minute contest. This proved to be a tame affair on which the referee cautioned the men to make a fight of it.

In this grade Cpl. Curran, 13th Batt. (brigade champion, 1943) and Sergt. O'Brien, 21st Batt., served up boxing of a high order; both men received a great ovation at the end, the verdict going to Curran.

**Welterweight**—Pte. Duggan, 21st Batt., and Tpr. McCormack, 1st Motor Squadron (Carrick Command champion, 1942) was another ding-dong affair while it lasted. Some very heavy punches were swapped and one of these sent McCormack to the floor, but he was up like a shot and soon had his opponent down for a count of eight. When Duggan got to his feet McCormack sailed in to land some heavy body punches, finishing with a right swing to the head to put Duggan down for the count.

**Pte. Roche, 13th Est., and Tpr. Meredith finished the Welter contest in a sparkling three rounds of good, clean, scientific boxing.** There was very little between the contestants, the verdict going to Tpr. Meredith.

**Middleweight**—Tpr. Mulligan, 1st Motor Squadron (and runner-up national championship, 1943) was matched against S. O'Sullivan, Waterford B.C. (and international representative) for four 2-minute rounds. Mr. Denis Fitzpatrick, Waterford B.C., acted as referee for this and the following fights.

Mulligan tore into his man from the word "go," and in the first

## DUNGARVAN URBAN COUNCIL.

Mr. L. A. Veale, Vice-Chairman, presided at the fortnightly meeting of the above on Friday last. Other members in attendance were Messrs. McGrath, J. Dahill and T. A. Kyne.

**Swimming Pool**—A letter from the Department notified a further grant of £445 towards the cost, estimated at £500 of further works on scheme, subject to the same conditions as previously.

**Annual Loan Charges**—A further letter from the Department notified instructions issued for the payment to the Council's Treasurers of £1,359 contribution of Annual Loan charges, payable under the Housing Act, 1936.

**Deilish Waterworks**—A letter from the County Manager stated that the further report on the above asked for from Messrs. Delap and Waller, Consulting Engineers, had not yet been received.

The report already before the Council was again adjourned.

**House Sewerage**—Mrs. Margaret Shina, Abbeyside, wrote in reference to the order of the sanitary authority re the connection of her house at Bicus Street to the sewer.

The letter pointed out that the lowest estimate she received for the work from the plumbers was £115. This sum she could not afford without drawing on capital. The houses only bring in 30/- a week and it seems hard on her to have to spend more than £100 on property that gives such a small return. She asked therefore to be allowed to postpone the carrying out of this work until after the war, when the cost of materials will be so much cheaper.

Mr. Bowen, Borough Surveyor, in a report on the foregoing stated that the houses were condemned four or five years ago and in the circumstances the best course is to let the sewers stand over for the present and when a new housing scheme is ready to put tenants into them to insist on the removal of the houses. The greater part of the site is wanted for road widening.

An order was made that having regard to the report of the Borough Surveyor, the matter of sewer connection be adjourned, the B.E. to report as to means of abating nuisance on surface channel and submit proposals in connection therewith.

**Resolutions**—The following resolutions were passed:—Proposed by Mr. Dahill and seconded by Mr. Kyne: That we request the Manager to start another scheme of houses immediately, the scheme to number at least 40 houses. Proposed by Mr. Kyne and seconded by Mr. Veale: That the Manager be asked to provide alternate bathing accommodation for ladies in view of the fact that their bathing place has been removed due to the construction of the swimming pool. Proposed by Mr. McGrath and seconded by Mr. Dahill: That the Minister for Local Government and Public Health be requested to confirm bye-laws made, signed and sealed at the meeting of the Council on 8th April, 1942, with respect to Slaughterhouses, and to see to the speedy conveyance of meat through the public thoroughfare.

**Acknowledgments**—Members thanking the Council for resolutions of sympathy passed to them were read from Rev. T. B. Walsh, P.P. St. Patrick's, Waterford, on the death of his brother, Mr. J. O'Dwyer, Waterford; Dunganvaran, on the death of his sister, and from Mr. E. M. Fleming, Main Street, Dunganvaran on the death of her aunt.

**Sympathy**—A vote of sympathy was passed with the Misses Sheehan, Square, Dunganvaran, on the death of their brother, the late John Sheehan.

**A Golden Jubilarian**—On Tuesday week, May 25th, Rev. Mother Patrick (Cunningham), Convent of Mercy, Kilmacthomas, had the privilege of celebrating the Golden Jubilee of her reception as a religious. Very Rev. T. B. Walsh, B.A., P.P. St. Patrick's, Waterford; Rev. M. Power, C.C. Kill, and Rev. J. Hally, C.C. Kilmacthomas, respectively, celebrated Holy Mass in the Convent Church on the auspicious occasion.

A minute had landed a smashing blow to the side of the head, which put Sullivan out for the count.

**Pte. E. Browne, 13th Batt. (Munster champion, 1943) met Pte. James O'Shea, 21st Batt. (runner-up brigade champion, 1943), and four rounds which proved a continuous thrill was the result.** Browne was the heavier and taller of the pair, while O'Shea was the more aggressive during the first three rounds. In the last round both men made herculean efforts to get a decisive result and for two minutes it was honour easy in a terrific struggle. O'Shea, who appeared to tire, instead of making use of the ring kept going in, when a left swing from Browne sent him to the canvas for a count of eight. He was up like a shot and again rushed in, but was forced to the ropes, where he was taking some heavy punishment when the gong sounded, the verdict going to Browne.

The Heavyweight contest, already referred to, concluded a capital programme.

## AITIRI NA HAISIRICHE.

On Monday night last an enthusiastic meeting under the auspices of the Aitiri na hAisiriche was held in the Town Hall, Dunganvaran. The principal speaker was Mr. T. O'Doherty (nephew of the late Cathal Brugha) who outlined the policy of the new movement. He strongly criticised the policies of the different political parties, and said that the only hope for the country lay in their organisation. They stood for the formation of a Corporate State based on Christian social principles. A revival of the national spirit was necessary if their native land was to attain its destiny. In the new State every citizen would do his duty, and they would fulfil the mission given them by Ireland's sacred dead. The speaker pointed out that Jews and Freemasons controlled their money while white stalked the land. They would end Partition and build up a Christian, Gaelic and free Ireland, and God would bless their work.

## AISEIRIGE SPIRIT GRIPS DUNGARVAN

A very large, representative and enthusiastic audience heard speakers at the Aisearige movement expounded the policy of Na h-Aitiri in the Town Hall on Monday evening. Thomas O'Donoghue (nephew of the great Cathal Brugha) spoke at length on the three main ideals which Aisearige is striving to realise—free thirty-two county Republic, a Gaelicised Eire, a Christian Gaelic state. Having said that God had undoubtedly preserved this nation to fulfil some glorious mission not by talk or writing but by actualised Christianity, he stressed the fact that a united thirty-two county Gaelic Eire could set out to do this noble work. He left no doubt in the mind of his hearers that Aisearige was prepared to make a blood sacrifice if necessary for the ideal for which past generations had fought.

## KILGIBNET DEFEAT OLD BORO AFTER FOUR DISPLAY.

At the Gaelic Field, Dunganvaran, on Sunday last, the Kilgibnet Junior footballers defeated the Dunganvaran team in a very hard-fought display. The winners, who had sun and a strong breeze in their favour in the first half were not impressive in the second half, but they were lucky to be employed in the positions as Returning Officers and Poll Clerks in the coming elections. **DEATH OF MR. D. K. AYLRARD**  
The Irish Banking profession has lost one of its most popular members by the death of Mr. David K. Aylward, which occurred at Maypark Nursing Home on Tuesday last, June 1st. The late Mr. Aylward, who was aged 48 years, came of a Co. Kilkenny family, the members of which are as widely known as they are universally respected. He was son of the late Mr. James Aylward, headmaster of Mullinavat, and of Mrs. Elizabeth Aylward. After a brilliant course of study he passed his examination for the National Bank with distinction. His first appointment was at the Lismore branch of the Bank. Thence he proceeded to Arran Quay, Dublin, and subsequently was attached to the branches at Portumna, Caradonagh and Dunganvaran, where he occupied the responsible position of sub-manager. A poignant feature of his passing was, we understand, that his appointment to a managerial post was to follow in the course of a short period. Socially the late Mr. Aylward was truly persona grata with all with whom he came in contact. As big of heart as he was big of nature, he was the life and soul of every company in which he found himself. Of an unvarying cheerful and sunny disposition, he readily won his way into the hearts of those who had the pleasure of associating with him, and it was but in the natural order of things that he should have left behind him in the various centres where he served as a bank official friends as countless as they were appreciative of his many outstanding and fine Irish qualities. Like all sons of his native county, the late Mr. Aylward had in his heart a very warm corner for his own native pastimes. He was an ardent enthusiast of the hurling code, and in his younger days wore a special jersey, a man with the best of the many stalwarts who have donned the black and amber. All other forms of outdoor sport found in him an equally keen supporter, and in these spheres, as elsewhere, he formed numberless friendships.

Subject to the conditions of the Scheme, grants will be equivalent to 50 per cent. of the approved estimated cost of the labour required for the improvement works.
