CAPPOQUIN NOTES.

Feast Of The Sacred Heart.—Imposing scenes were witnessed at the Convent of the Sacred Heart in connection with the above Feast on Friday last and next, which was the feast day. After Mass had been celebrated in the Convent chapel the Blessed Sacrament was carried in Procession around the Convent Grounds and back to the altar. The altar was beautifully decorated for the occasion. Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament was carried on all day on Friday and Saturday and concluded on Sunday morning, when another procession was held which again surpassed that of Friday. The weather was beautiful on both occasions. The glorious summer sun shone down in all its splendour on the processions as they slowly wended their way around the grounds, singing beautiful sacred hymns. The Cappoquin Brass Band under the able conductorship of Mr. M. J. Sargent was in attendance. Following the procession solemn benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament was given in the Community Chapel and the players for peace were large crowds of the faithful took part in the ceremonies which were marked by the usual fervour and devotion throughout.

BUNGALOW BURGLED

Mother and Daughter, Charged With Housebreaking and Larceny.—Bridget Sarsfield (39) and her daughter, Bridget Sarsfield, junior (19), were in the dock charged with housebreaking and larceny, when Mr. Justice James J. Scaly opened the County Criminal business at the Waterford Circuit Court on Monday last. This was the only case from County Waterford on the list. Bridget Sarsfield, junior, pleaded guilty to having (1) on a date unknown between December 1st, 1942, and May 31, 1943, broken and entered the dwellinghouse of Mrs. Elizabeth Cashin, at Knockmahon, Bonmahon, Co. Waterford, and stolen a number of household articles including delph, carpets, overmantel, curtains and saucers, of a total value of more than £5; (2) to having on a date unknown between December 1, 1942, and May 31, 1943, broken and entered the dwellinghouse of Mrs. Elizabeth Cashin, at Knockmahon, Bonmahon, Co. Waterford, and stolen carpets of a total value of more than £5. Bridget Sarsfield, senior (mother) pleaded not guilty to both these charges.

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COMMITTAL OF CO. WATERFORD WOMAN

The Supreme Court (Chief Justice Sullivan, Mr. Justice Murnaghan, Mr. Justice Geoghegan, Mr. Justice O'Byrne and Mr. Justice Black) gave judgement, dismissing with costs, the appeal of Miss Kitty Power, Kill, Co. Waterford, from so much of an Order of the High Court as refused to make absolute a conditional Order of certiorari directed to Mr. William Jones and Mr. Patrick J. Murray, Messrs. Commissioners, to bring into the High Court for the purpose of being quashed their warrant committing Miss Power to Waterford Mental Hospital. It appeared that Miss Power was arrested by Sergt. Horgan at Kill on October 15th, 1941, and taken to Waterford, where she was charged before Messrs. Jones and Murray with having struck the sergeant's daughter with a switch, and with having threatened to injure other children on other dates. The Peace Commissioners convicted her and committed her to Waterford Mental Hospital, where she was received on their warrant. She was released on October 30 in consequence of a letter from her solicitor. The High Court quashed the order of conviction, but held that the warrant of committal was valid.
