Few are aware of the link which exists between our country and St. Thomas More, the great English saint and martyr, whose feast oc-curs this month, for the story of the Stradbally Portrait is almost un-

known.

In or about the year 1855 a bazaar was held in Stradbally, Co. Waterford, in aid of the local church fund. Father Tracey, then curate in Clogheen, Co. Tipperary, received tickets, some of which he handed to a Miss Hackett, who later became Mrs. Collins, asking her to help him to sell them. She, being always anxious to aid in a charitable cause, sold a large number. Father Treacy felt very grateful to her for her generous help and expressed his regret that she was unlucky in the draw. However, he

himself won a large oil painting of gentleman in picture sque robes. It was without a title; painted on plain boards and signed 'Horoein. When leaving Clogheen, Fother Tracey cent the picture to Miss Backett with note saying that if she could find no. other use for it, it would "do for the tail-board of a donkey's cart." The lady, however, did not put it to the use suggested by the good priest, but treasured the picture for the sake of


