From Official Handbook Muintir Na Tire To say that a country is "largely agricultural" conveys very little information. Ireland is largely agricultural, yet in the year 1939 we imported wheat valued at £3,000,000; maize valued at £2,250,000 and oil cakes and other foods costing another £1,000,000. The total bill paid for foods for man and domestic stock in that year was £6,250,000. In the same way Denmark, which before the war had more agricultural exports per square mile of area than any other country, imported a very considerable quantity of her foodstuffs.

Even on a 200-acre mixed tillage and stock farm the type of agricultural machinery used is effective in minimising the drudgery of human labour rather than in drastically reducing the numbers employed. Over 80 per cent of the agricultural land of this country is divided into holdings of less than 200 acres.
