SELF-SUFFICIENCY IN FOOD From Official Handbook Muintir Na Tire


To say that a country is "largely agricultural" conveys very little information. Ireland is largely agricultural, yet in the year 1939 we imported wheat valued at £3,000,000; maize valued at £2.250,000 and oil asked with the reads conting on the sales and other foods conting on cakes and other foods costing an-other £1.000,000. The total bill paid for foods for man and domestic stock in that year was £6,250,000.
