We take the following from "I Sketch Your World" by Gertrude Gaffney in last Friday's issue of the "Independent": "Father P. Cummins, O.S.A., Prior of St. Augustine's, Cork, is responsible for a novel plan to get funds for the interesting new church he is building in the middle of Cork. He is holding an exhibition of paintings, to be opened in Cork tomorrow, to which all the best-known Irish artists have contributed. He has received gifts of pictures from Mr. Dermot O'Brien, President of the Royal Hibernian Academy, Jack Yeats, Estella Solomons, Humbert Prang, Mainie Jellett, Rosamond Frazer, Lillian Davidson, S. McCann, H. Keenan, Sean McManus, Sean Dixon, F. McKelvey, George Collier, Albert Power, to mention only a few of the long list of prominent artists who have come to his help, so it ought to be a very interesting show. Artists are invariably unselfish and generous in helping the endeavours of others. It is to be hoped that this chance to get to know and acquire the work of the best Irish artists from both sides of the border may arouse future interest in their art among the Cork public that can afford to buy pictures. Too many of our well-off citizens are prone to see value for their hard cash only in motor cars and fur coats, forgetting that the real test of worth is the taste a man displays for things of beauty, whether they be Art or of Nature."

ARMY CHAMPIONSHIPS AT DUNGARVAN

At the Gaelic Field, Dungarvan, on Sunday last, the First Brigade met and defeated the Fifth Brigade in both hurling and football in the second round of the All-Ireland Championships. Though the hurling match was of a high standard, an exhibition of football was given that was a revelation and football fans present from all over the county were charmed with such a magnificent game. They had eagerly looked forward to the meeting of these teams which included such well known players as Benny Lynch (Roscommon), Danny Douglas (Laois); Eamonn Young and Minoque of Cork and O'Leary of Tipperary, and numerous other well-known players. The keenest rivalry existed between the sides but the games were played in a most sportsmanlike manner typical of the Irish Army. High fielding, long kicking and wonderful combinations were the special features of the football game. Rough tactics of the slightest nature were completely cut out. We hope that our own referees took a note of the control of the games Sunday's referee exercised.

HURLING.
The First Brigade had a strong wind in their favour in this half and put up a lead of 2-5 to 1-1 before half time. The hurling was very fast, clean and scientific during this half. On the turn over the 'Black' Fifth forged ahead and had the lead reduced in a short time, but the First rallied strongly to win by a four-point margin. Tommy Murphy (Dungarvan) was one of the Fifth's most dangerous forwards. Wall (Waterford City) was another hard worker on the Fifth selection. The final score was: First Brigade, 4-8; Fifth Brigade, 2-10.

FOOTBALL.
The Fifth Brigade had the advantage of the wind in the first half. Lynch (Roscommon's All-Ireland footballer) proved himself a wonderful fielder and kicker and made full use of any chances that came his way. He was outstanding among a brilliant galaxy of footballers all during the game, when he put a free from the side-line, thirty yards over the bar he received a great ovation. He was ably assisted by Douglas. Young at centre-field for the First, started two great passing movements which ended in goals for his side. The First led by 1-2 to 2-2 at interval. Shortly after the resumption the First drew level and the Fifth, at the interval, had a number of close-in frees which were utilised to the best advantage and despite a strong challenge from the Fifth, at the end of the game they led by 2-9 to 1-10. M. McGuire (Kiltrossery) and Wall (Waterford) played well for the Fifth.

Three Bands discoursed a delightful programme of music before, after the intervals and after the matches. About ten thousand spectators were present. We wish Lieut. Daly and his First Brigade teams success in their future encounters.
