COUNTY BOARD OF PUBLIC ASSISTANCE

Mr. David Coghlan, Chairman, presided at the monthly meeting of the County Board of Assistance on Monday last, other members in attendance were Messrs. P. Cahill, L. A. Veale, M. McGrath, Senator J. Butler and Mr. D. Heskin, T.D., Mr. M. Flynn, Secretary, Mrs. P. A. Croke, Assistant Secretary, and Mr. Phelan, S.H.A.O. were also present.

Appointment.—A letter from the Acting City Manager and Town Clerk, Waterford, notified the appointment as a member of the Board of Assistance of Mr. T. Lynch in room of Mr. Jas. O'Connor.

Fuel Scheme.—The Secretary stated that the fuel scheme as operated last winter would again be applied for the coming winter. The scheme will apply to Home Assistance recipients in the City and Dungarvan.

Mr. Heskin, T.D.—Will it not apply to any other town. Secretary.—This particular scheme does not apply to any other town but as last year the Manager has made an order granting the benefit of the scheme to recipients in Lismore, Cappoquin and Tallow.

Mr. Heskin referring to the difficulty, even in country places, to get timber said that those in a position to give the timber will not get permits to cut.

The Hospitalisation Scheme.—Senator Butler asked if the County Hospitalisation Scheme is altogether in abeyance, or if anything is being done. He said everyone knows the need for the scheme in the City and County and said that now is the time to deal with the preliminary work so that the schemes could start immediately hostilities ceased.

The Secretary said that as regards the County Hospitalisation Scheme, as far as the chronic cases there were to be transferred to the Mental Hospital where suitable arrangements were to be made to take place thus relieving the Co. Home.

The Chairman said that the war was not responsible for the delay in extending the Mental Hospital, but twelve years ago they appointed an architect there and everything was ready to start.

The Secretary stated that all the preliminary work in connection with the scheme is completed both for the County Hospital, Waterford and the District Hospital, Dungarvan.

Mr. Heskin—Lisamore, there is also land purchased there. Secretary.—Yes, the Lisamore Fever Hospital is in the same position. All the preliminary work has been completed and we have the three places, Co. Hospital, Dungarvan District Hospital and Lisamore Fever Hospital and if the emergency is over we can proceed immediately after the war provided the money is in the Hospital Fund. They have already paid over £6,000 in connection with the preliminary work which has, so far, cost the ratepayers nothing.

Secretary.—Our T.D.s and Senators should drop into the Department on the matter.

Mr. Heskin, T.D. said everything should be in readiness to proceed after the emergency so that men who leave the army can get employment.

The Secretary's suggestion that Messrs. Heskin and Butler call into the Department's office was approved.
