In the Dail, on Thursday, November 4th, Mr. W. J. Broderick, T.D. (South East Cork), on the question of the Youghal Bridge, said:— I wish to refer to an acute controversy between the Department of Local Government and my Council and the Urban Council of Youghal.

One of the vital things in the selection of a site is local requirements. The Minister has recently suggested that a sum of £10,000 be provided by the County Councils of Cork and Waterford for preliminary investigation and survey of sites.

In other words, the Minister is not prepared to avail himself of the existing law. The Minister has actually introduced the new legislation, but he has set down a suggestion that we should get a sum of £10,000 for survey of the sites.

IRISH RED CROSS SOCIETY MEETING OF THE COUNTY COMMITTEE.

At a meeting of the Waterford County Committee of the Irish Red Cross Society, at which delegates from the various branches in the county were present, the progress of the society throughout the county was reviewed.

The reports of the various activities of the society in the county were received, and in the main considered satisfactory. The relatively small membership for the county (731) was regarded with concern, and the committee recommended to the branches in more energetic canvass for members, when the position would be very quickly rectified.

The Hon. County Secretary reported on the arrival of 23 cases of medical supplies in the county, part of the gift of supplies sent to this country by the Red Cross Society of the U.S.A.

It was reported that branches had been especially asked to organise classes in child welfare, hygiene and sanitation, and invalid cookery. The latter course had already been organised by three branches—Ballyduff, Ferrycarrig and Cappoquin.

Emergency clothing depots had been provided in some areas and also survey for emergency housing had been made in case of necessity. Branches had been asked to canvass gifts for the Red Cross sale to be held shortly in Dublin.

PETER O'NEILL-CROWLEY. GREAT IRISHMAN'S LAST MOMENTS.

The following are extracts from a letter from Colonel John McCurtain to Kate O'Neill-Crowley, sister of the great East Cork patriot, Peter O'Neill-Crowley.

Having thought the extreme watchfulness of the police and soldiers being separated from the rest of my party on Saturday, 30th March, we (Peter, Kelly and myself), lay concealed in the house of a friend until about 4 o'clock on the morning of the 31st (Sunday), when we left this house and marched along in a southerly direction, and had gone about half a mile when we heard a body of soldiers coming up against us.
