The Department hopes that all of the district interested will be present to meet Mr. Morrissey on the occasion of his visit."

Compulsory Tillage.—Following the reading of a report of a meeting held by the Nire farmers protesting against the Emergency order compelling them to sow wheat in one-tenth of their arable land, Mr. O'Ryan emphasized the unsuitability of the Nire district as a wheat growing area. It was absolutely manifest, he said, to class this county with Meath and Tipperary. In Cork certain areas were classified in one or two parts of Co. Waterford, he said, as bad as the Nire district. It would be better if the Government compelled the people in these areas to buy wheat and make a present of it to the nation. He suggested that a Dept. Inspector should come down to inspect the area.

After some more discussion the following resolution was adopted:—"That the Emergency Order compelling farmers to put one-tenth of arable land under wheat is too drastic for the mountain." Mr. O'Ryan, while agreeing that all farmers with exception in particular cases, should grow wheat, he thought that it will not help but rather retard food production to compel farmers to seed into land which will not return more than a like amount. Proof of this is forthcoming from attempts by farmers in the Nire area who have got only a return of 14 barrels per acre. We ask the Department to send down a supervisor to visit these areas at the earliest date possible, with a view to having this matter cleared up."

Miss B. Norris was appointed deputy for the Secretary, during his illness.

A Resolution from the Westmeath Co. Committee of Agriculture, asking the Government to fix the price of wheat at not less than 80/- per barrel, was adopted.

Day of Meeting.—On a notice of motion by Mr. Dover, the day of meeting was changed from Wednesday to Saturday.

When Mr. O'Ryan asked would the lime scheme continue after the war, Mr. Hurley said the scheme was not an emergency precaution and it was a matter for the Committee to adopt a subsidy or otherwise.

CO. WATERFORD COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE WATERFORD FIRM CHARGED BEFORE SPECIAL CRIMINAL COURT.

Mr. M. F. Walsh, president of a meeting of the above on Tuesday, Edward Hill & Sons, Ltd., Kilmachthomas, Co. Waterford, Edward Hill, junr., and James Ryan, Ballynabogue, Kilmachthomas, were charged with offences under the Emergency Powers Order relating to the sale of flour, coal and sugar. The company had pleas of guilty entered on the 51 charges brought against it. Hill pleaded guilty to two charges of consenting to irregularities as a director, and Ryan to one of consenting as manager of the firm and to three of purchasing coal for domestic use without a permit. The reading of the 57 charges occupied 44 minutes.

The Company was charged it regard to coal with purchasing anthracite from J. A. Nolan without a permit. The amount was 5 tons. The Company was charged with selling coal slack, 38 charges, and sugar, 9 charges. Mr. Murraghan, S.C., who with Mr. A. O. Cully (instructed by Mr. L. J. Loughmore, Chief State Solicitor-General) prosecuted, said the offences were very serious. The transactions in general indicated that this firm was prepared to enter into a black market and to disregard all the regulations regarding the control and distribution of the commodities imposed by the Department of Supplies. He asked the Court to impose heavy penalties.

Mr. M. Binchey, S.C. (instructed by Mr. A. R. Farrell, solicitor, Dungarvan) defending, said that the company was formed about three years ago. There were extenuating circumstances with regard to the coal and flour charges. The only commodity for which the defendants charged more than the control price was sugar. They had not bought any commodity at excessive prices; there was not a charge of their having bought in a black market. They sold the flour because if they did not do so it would have gone bad and they sold it at the correct price. The whole of the sugar involved had been bought in March, 1941, when there was no control. They were imported to sell and yielding to the temptation of high prices, they sold 124 tons.

Bessie.—Wednesday.—Edward Hill & Sons, Ltd., fined £1,000; Edwd. Hill, junr., a director of the firm, £250, and J. J. Ryan, manager of the firm, £50. Ballynabogue Social Club concluded a successful 45 drive in Kilmachthomas on Sunday night last. After some closely contested games the first prize, of £4, was won by Mrs. M. Dahill and her partner. Runners-up who secured £1 10s. each were Messrs. Jas. Greaney, Cauty, and T. Keane, Colligan; and Thos. Murray and J. Maher.

He stated that an additional £20 would be forwarded when refunded by the Revenue Commissioners. The Chairman said he thought that they would have £20 or £30 with that. Mr. Morrissey said that they should express their appreciation to the L.D.F. add to all those who helped at the carival. He proposed that the Clerk write to them to that effect.

Allotments.—Replying to Mr. L. A. Veale, the Acting Clerk said that only 45 applications for plots had been received to date. Mr. Veale said that the position as regards the necessity for increased allotting of plots should be pointed out strongly. There was a number of people with nice gardens who could till them more, while there were other people with gardens who had made no use of them at all. He thought that anyone who had a garden should make use of it. He would suggest that these people who had gardens, and who were making no use of them, should offer them to the Council, and the Council could provide people with these who would till them.

The Acting Clerk pointed out that an announcement inviting allotment applications was made in the churches last Sunday. Replying to a member, he said that there were 120 applications last year. He also stated that no offer of land had yet been received in reply to the Council's advertisement. Mr. Morrissey—We will have to do something about that.

Mr. Veale.—The difficulty about the plots is that they are left too late. To Mr. Butler, the Acting Clerk said that next year the latest time for applications was the end of December. This year, in view of the shortage of food, it was decided to make an early start. Tenders for seeds had already been received.

Mr. O'Meara also pointed out that the plot-holders had an association last year; they had none this year. Mr. Veale—it would be a good thing if the plot-holders got together again this year and formed an association. Acting Clerk.—You can't do anything until you get the allotment forms in.

Price of Potatoes.—Arising from the discussion on allotments, Mr. Veale said that the attention of the Minister should be called to the price of potatoes in Dungarvan. The price per stone, he said, was 2/6. Following a statement by the Chairman that he read that the price of potatoes was cheaper in Dublin, Mr. Kyne remarked that prices in Dungarvan were always once and a half those in Dublin. The price of potatoes should be regulated and people should not be given a free whip.

The price of milk was also referred to. Repairs to Houses.—Mr. Kyne drew attention to a house, No. 26, Loughmore, which he said, had been repaired three weeks ago. The water was coming in through the walls of a bedroom, and the bed and a wardrobe had to be taken away. The Chairman drew attention to a house in Loughmore. The walls in one room were "weeping," the paper fell off the walls, and the furniture had to be taken out of it.

Mr. Kyne—It is a bad scheme of houses. Chairman—I saw this house on Saturday. The paper actually fell off the walls, and the furniture had to be taken out. The tenant of the house pays his rent, and pays it regularly I am sure, and it isn't fair to him or to any other tenant like him. We are told to bring up our families decently

but how are people expected to bring them up under conditions like these? Repairs have been sent in time after time about repairs for houses and it has taken several months to carry them out.

The repairs were referred to the B.S. Town Hall Complaint.—The Chairman referred to the recent blocking of the lavatory at the Town Hall and the blocking of the stage door. He held that this door should be left as it was. A wall had been built there, closing this exit.

Mr. Morrissey—But there is an exit at the big gate. Chairman—There is, but this other exit should be there too. The more exits the better. I think it's not the proper thing to do. That door should have been left there. I ask any of the members to look at it and I think they will agree with me.

To a member, the Acting Clerk said that the lavatory was erected to comply with the dance hall regulations. The Chairman said he understood that the lavatory was to be erected in the Green Room, not that he was in favour of having it there. They all knew that this door was used on many occasions at concerts, boxing tournaments, etc. People going to the front seats paid their money at this door.

"Indeed," continued the Chairman, "to say the least, we should have been asked about it. We are treated as if we were not elected by the people at all. We are like so many idiots coming here to the meetings." Senator Butler—I should think that some plan should have come before us.

Mr. Morrissey—Is this part of the big scheme for the town? Acting Clerk—That scheme was dropped. He could not say if it is in accordance with that scheme. Mr. Morrissey—I don't think so. Chairman—There is plenty of space for a lavatory without blocking the door.

Mr. Kyne—It's only proper to protest about it. Chairman—The least that could be done first was to submit plans. As a matter of courtesy it should be done. Mr. Veale asked was it necessary to have a small door in the gate. The Chairman said he thought a small door would be better, as draughts were coming through the gate and up under the boards.

The Acting Clerk said that that portion of the hall was used as a cycle park. Abbeyside Road's Condition.—Mr. Veale called attention to the condition of the road at Sheares Street (Home Rule Street) and said that it badly needed repairs. Referred to B.S.

THE IRISH RED CROSS.

The Irish Red Cross Society, since its formation in 1939, has penetrated into every part of Ireland, so that practically every parish now has its active branch of fully trained, competent nurses (in all there are now 700 active branches throughout the country). The Society is just now inaugurating a nation-wide drive in an endeavour to raise £500,000. This money is to be used in the interests of suffering humanity. In the first instance, it will be devoted to the opening and equipping of homes in this country in the campaign against the tuberculosis scourge which, according to official returns, kills 1,500 of our young boys and girls, young fathers and mothers, every year. This dread disease is both curable and preventable if the sufferers can be given proper care and treatment.

Again, the funds of the Society will be given towards the alleviation of famine and disease in the stricken countries throughout the world. Since the establishment of the Irish Red Cross Society, relief to the extent of £25,145 has been given towards relief of distress at home and in foreign countries; and in addition to the above, a sum of £14,884 has been expended providing for shipwrecked sailors all around our coast and accommodation for refugees from Great Britain and from Belfast, and providing immediate relief and housing for the victims of the Dublin North Strand bombing.

We have received a booklet which will in the course of a week be circulated widely. It gives harrowing details of the sufferings relieved by the Red Cross.
