Boyle, was a member of the Waterford A.S.U., and her daughters did herculean work for the cause as members

WARNING TO TILLAGE DEFAULTERS

About January 14 would be an effective date to put into operation the Minister's powers to take over land where no attempt had been made to comply with the Tillage Order, said Mr. de Valera, at a meet-ing in Cork on Monday under the auspices of the Co. Committee of Agriculture.

The fact that they had been promised white bread did not mean that there was wheat to spare, he added. Due to last year's shortage there would be great difficulty with this year's bread supplies and the Minister had asked that 700,000 acres of wheat should be grown.

They would have to import 160,000 tons to make up the shortage. In addition they would require 265,000 acres of barley, 1,100,000 of oats, 600,000 of potatoes, 85,000 of beet, and 250,000 of other root crops—3,000,000 acres in all.

From the national point of view one of the ways by which a people could be coerced into doing things they did not want to do was by starvation. They would have to make their position such that there would be no temptation of that

The price fixed for produce was fair, and it was not right, in a time of crisis, that farmers should use their position to make it impossible for a large section of the people to get their daily bread.
