INTERESTING LECTURE IN TECHNICAL SCHOOL

A very informative and interesting ecture on "Common Disease of the Potato Crop," was given by Pro-fessor R. McKay, Royal Dublin Society, at Sgoil na gCeard, on Wednesday night. Very Rev. T. Canon O'Brien, P.P., V.F., Chairman, Waterford Voca-Education Committee, pre-

At the outset Professor McKay said that as potato diseases generally emanated from fungi, he would tell It was an ordinary blue mould such as was often seen on stale bread, butter, jam, etc. When it is shaken fungi-spors get into the air. These spors were fungi seeds which re-Tracing the history of the potato the lecturer said that it was not until about the 16th century that there was any definite reference to the | potato, when following a Spanish expedition to South America it was reported that the potato was grown there. From that until 1830 there was no further account of the potato. In 1830, blight, as far as was known, made its first appearance in the isle of St. Helena. The disease spread and in 1840 it appeared in Boston, U.S.A. and from that to the black years of '45 and '46. There was a theory in existance that the blight came from North America to Europe. If that was so, why didn't it appear before 1830 and 1840? In 1888, Jansen, a Dane, experimented on the blight, and as a result he showed that the passing the Torrid Zone became
