In view of the shortage of new brooder-heaters it is suggested that committees should arrange to include present owners of to procure chicks at a reduced pirce for a total of more than three seasons. The number of new in cubators and hovers in the country is also likely to be very limited thi season, but where supplies may be ayai lable, committees are recommended to provide, as in 1941, grants towards the purchase of incubators and hoovers. Owing to increased

building costs it is suggested that grants towards the erection of chicken houses should be raised to £5. With a view to ensuring wide publicity for the facilities provided under the various poultry schemes, the committee should arrange for the circulation throughout county of posters and handbills calling attention to the matter. Poultry instructors should be instructed to give lectures and demonths and take every opportunity to bring the facilities afforded by the chemes to the notice of poultryeepers. In view of existing con-itions, it is essential that instructors should strongly advise poultry-k-eepers to do their utmost to pro-duce and conserve to the fullest
