DUNGARVAN PARISH COUNCIL.

Very Rev. Canon O'Brien, P.P., V.F., Chairman, presided at a meeting of the Parish Council on Monday night.

Timber for Firewood.—The Secretary and Mr. Bowen gave the members a report on their recent visit to Miss Nugent, Clonoscraire estate, as a result of which the Council will, in the course of a few days, be in a position to supply timber to the residents.

Replying to the Very Rev. Chairman, the Secretary stated that everything was in readiness to begin work the following morning. Fellers and carters were available and ready to start.

Insurance of Men.—The Secretary raised the question of the insurance of the timber fellers, etc., stating that from a recent conversation he had with a person conversant with the law on this matter, they were actually making a present of the premium to the insurance company, because of the fact that the men employed had contracted for the work and as contractors were not covered by the policy.

LATE MR. THOMAS MURRAY, ABBEYSIDE.

SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATE FOR AGRICULTURE.

Mr. D. Heskin, T.D., speaking in the Dail in the debate on above subject, said—The first matter with which I shall deal is the power of inspectors appointed by the Minister for Agriculture. I think the inspectors should be well instructed before they leave the Department as to the terms of the Tillage Order.

Another point that was raised in the discussion is the inspection of machinery. It was suggested that there is a considerable amount of waste. All I have to say in regard to that is that if the people who grumble about the inspection of machinery that is used for the threshing of wheat inspected the crops before they were harvested, there would be very little waste, because I hold that many crops, particularly wheat, are being harvested much too soon, when no thrasher, no matter how well made, can get the wheat from the straw.

What should always be a great help to farmers would be the extension of the scheme to farm buildings. We all know that very few farms, particularly in view of the intensive tillage programme at present, are able to provide accommodation for seed wheat, corn, barley and other crops, for the simple reason that there is a great shortage of sacks.

With regard to machinery, to my mind the distribution of machinery is handled from a very wrong angle. So far as I can learn it is the managers of co-operative societies who have the allocation of machinery in their own areas. We know very well that where a co-operative concern handles machinery, they employ men to cut the crops of the shareholders in a particular area; but we also know that, when evening comes, such men are anxious to get home, and the farmers will not get from these men the returns he will get from private owners who are out to do as much as they can in the matter of hiring and who will do twice as much as the co-operative men have done in the past.

CHILDREN'S ALLOWANCES ACT, 1944.

The Minister for Industry and Commerce desires to inform all persons who will be entitled to claim allowances under the provisions of the Children's Allowances Act that claimants will be required to satisfy the Minister that the Children, in respect of whom a claim is made, are under the age of 16 years on 1st May, 1944.

In order to facilitate prospective claimants, a form (G.R.O. Form A.3), which will be accepted as evidence of age for all the children in a family, has now been printed and is obtainable at any Post Office.

Persons WHO HAVE THREE OR MORE CHILDREN WHO WILL STILL BE UNDER THE AGE OF 16 YEARS ON THE 1st MAY, 1944, should obtain this form IMMEDIATELY; fill it up in accordance with the instructions on the back of the form and send or deliver it to the local Registrar or Superintendent Registrar of Births.

Prospective claimants are advised, in their own interests, not to delay in having the ages of their children verified on this form. It may be difficult to do so at a later date, and the payment of Children's Allowances would be delayed in the absence of the required evidence of age.

Baptismal certificates will also be accepted as evidence of age. Such certificates (if it is proposed to use them in preference to G.R.O. Form A.3) should likewise be obtained IMMEDIATELY.

When G.R.O. Form A.3. is returned by the Registrar or Superintendent Registrar, or when baptismal certificates have been obtained, THEY SHOULD BE RETAINED-CAREFULLY until the Claim Forms for Children's Allowances, which are in course of preparation, have been issued. Further instructions regarding the completion of the claim form will be advertised at a later date.

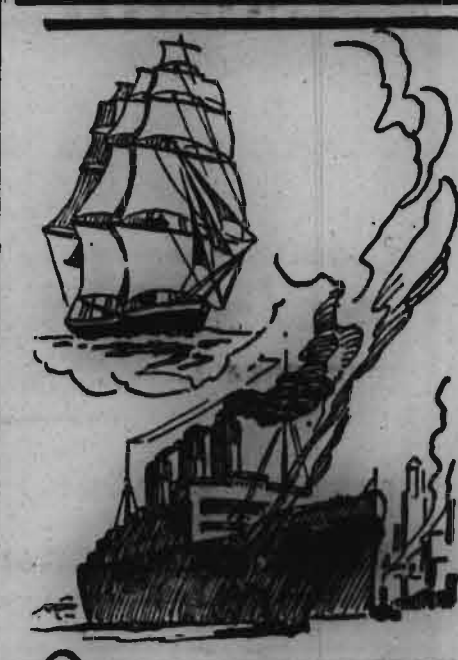
