During the second reading of the Arterial Drainage Bill in the Dail on 20th February, Mr. D. Heskin, T.D., said:
I welcome this Drainage Bill. No doubt it is a very important Bill for the country in general, but I would suggest that such a gigantic scheme as this should not be undertaken until such times as conditions are restored to normal after the emergency.
In the first place, you cannot get labour. At different meetings designed to encourage the production of food for the nation, we find that labour is the problem, and if such a Bill as this is to be put into force in the near future, we are to see the necessary labour? I suggest that the scheme be left over until after the war.
