THE LATE LORD CHARLES CAVENTISH.

Fianna Fall.—Mr. Morrissey, T.D., was present at the annual general meeting of the Mid-Waterford Comhairle Ceannair, which was held at the Courthouse, Kilmathomas, on Sunday last. Delegates in attendance and the clubs who were represented were Messrs. M. Hassett and J. McGrath (Clonea-Power); F. Roche, T. Wall, R. Faulkner (Portlaur); Sean Kent, Sean Desmond, N.T., M. Murphy, D. Lannon, N. Power, J. Power (Kilmathomas); W. Lennihan, M. Power (Newtown); T. J. Power, P.C. and R. O'Connor (Kilrossanty); M. Morris (Crehana); J. Foran, R. Power (Gullcra); A. Kirwan (Dunabratrin); J. Kirwan, M.C.C. (Bonmahon); N. Dalton (Kill); M. Keane, R. Roche, and M. Kiely (Ballyliscane); T. Cahill, N.T., and L. Gleeson, V.S. (Stradbally). Mr. P. J. Little, T.D., Minister for Posts and Telegraphs, wrote saying that owing to unforeseen circumstances he was unable to attend. All the outgoing officers were unanimously re-elected, viz., Chairman, Mr. T. J. Power, P.C.; vice-chairman, Mr. Sean Kent; hon. treas. Mr. M. Keating, P.C. (Kilrossanty); hon. sec., Mr. Wm. Lennihan. Mr. P. J. Little said he had occupied the chair for the past 13 years; he did not like to be greedy, and would welcome a change. His confreres appealed to him to continue and he eventually acceded to their request. A letter received from the County Manager for Posts and Telegraphs, wrote stating that County Council workmen were granted an increase of 2/- in their weekly wages. Deputy Morrissey promised to look into a number of local matters mentioned by the Stradbally delegates. Arising out of representations made to the Minister for Posts and Telegraphs regarding the postal delivery in the Clonea-Power area, correspondence was read from Mr. Little, T.D., in which the Minister expressed regret that the Department was not prepared to grant further facilities. Mr. Morrissey, T.D.—I have written further with a view to procuring an everyday delivery. Chairman—don't agree with the present arrangements.

Waterford Hounds.—Riders and jockeys of the hounds and foot were accorded a topping day's sport from the

in the Kilrossanty and Stradbally districts. Deputy Morrissey suggested that a committee be formed to go into these matters with the postal authorities. He thought that better arrangements could be made in the way of deliveries in the respective districts mentioned without entailing additional cost. On the proposition of Mr. Cahill, N.T., it was decided to act on Mr. Morrissey's suggestion, and the latter assured the meeting that the committee appointed would receive his support.

The question of the provision of a playing field for the schoolchildren of Kilmathomas was referred to Mr. Ormond, N.T., he to furnish full particulars to Deputy Morrissey. The Chairman tabled a resolution (which was seconded by Mr. Roche and passed a vote) re Old I.R.A. pensions, and spoke of the injustice done to genuine applicants whose claims had been rejected. His resolution read: "That we the members of the Mid-Waterford Comhairle Ceannair strongly support Mr. M. Morrissey, T.D., in the appeal made by him in the Dail recently for reconsideration of the claims of members of the Old I.R.A. whose applications were turned down. We consider that a great injustice has been done to them and we respectfully request the Government to enact amending legislation immediately so that their services would be adequately, rightly and practically recognised." The Secretary was directed to forward copies to the Ministers of Defence and Finance, respectively.

Mr. Morrissey said he felt very strongly over the matter. He didn't want to make cases for those who were not entitled to an award, but there was a number of men—indeed, a number of women—who were turned down. The Minister should hold for genuine cases. He firmly believed that there are genuine cases, he didn't see the necessity for introducing an amending Act to deal fair and square treatment to them.

The meeting recommended the provision of two extra public lamps to supply adequate light by night at St. Anne's Terrace, Kilmathomas, and Mr. Morrissey promised to pursue the matter with the proper authority. A resolution respectfully requesting the Minister to make the necessary arrangements for a scheduled turf area was on the proposition of Mr. Ormond, N.T., seconded by Mr. Kent, passed unanimously. The proposer, Mr. Ormond, and other members of the local Parish Council had gone to Lyre together earlier that day and failed to get a turf, and the meeting stressed the point that poor people cannot purchase either timber or turf locally. Mr. Morrissey, T.D.—The County Council has the right to require any bog in the county that they may see fit to make available and develop. Mr. Lannon—As Mr. Kent has indicated, the poor people here are very hard hit for fuel.

Some business of a routine nature having been disposed of, Mr. Morrissey briefly addressed the assembly and in the course of his remarks urged the delegates to strive their utmost to get as many new members as they possibly can into active clubs, and to go all out to make this year's collection for their great national organisation the best ever in the Mid-Waterford area. He stressed the sovereignty of the Irish nation and with the attempt recently made to infringe upon their neutrality and said they were fortunate in having as leader Mr. Eamonn de Valera, who to-day is admired by all of Irish blood the wide world over. He stressed the unhesitating, firm and dignified manner in which he, on behalf of his Government and people, has dealt with this unexpected assault upon the rights of this small nation of ours. (Applause.) Proceeding, Mr. Morrissey asserted that the policy of Fianna Fail was right to the line, and that their leader and Government merited the fullest support of all in the homeland. An Taoiseach has stood fast upon their neutrality, and we can be assured that his attitude is the correct one. "In the best interests of the motherland we must have strong support from our Government, and our peerless leader must remain in power," concluded Mr. Morrissey. Deputy renewed and prolonged applause.

A vote of thanks to Mr. Morrissey, which he suitably acknowledged, brought the meeting to a close. The T.D. was subsequently interviewed by delegates from a number of centres in the area who are seeking to have public pumps erected to provide their families and themselves with an adequate supply of water for domestic purposes. CO. WATERFORD COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE.

Mr. P. R. Power, Chairman, presided at the monthly meeting of the Waterford County Committee of Agriculture, at the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on Saturday last. Also present: Messrs. M. McGrath, W. Dower, M. O'Ryan, M. Hartly, and D. Heskin, T.D. Scholarships.—The Secretary read the Department's letter regarding agricultural scholarships for boys and girls, and said that the examination would be held on April 22nd. A letter was read in connection with this matter from Mrs. Qually, St. Anthony's Nursing Home, Dungarvan, asking if her son, who was now going with her parents, was eligible to sit for the examination.

At the request of a member, the Secretary read the qualification relating to this, in which it was pointed out that a boy's parents must derive their livelihood wholly or substantially from farming pursuits and must be resident or holders of land in the rural districts of the county.

Following a discussion on the matter, the Committee agreed that the boy was eligible to sit for the examination. University Scholarship.—A letter was read from the County Council asking the views of the Committee on the question of providing a scholarship in the faculty of agriculture tenable at a university.

The Secretary said there were four existing scholarships at present—three tenable at the provincial agricultural colleges and one at the Albert College.

Mr. O'Ryan asked would it be advisable to go through the provincial colleges first.

Mr. Hartly said that in Cork University there was a faculty of dairying science. A boy in order to qualify had only to pass matriculation or the leaving certificate. There was no faculty of agriculture there as far as he knew. The knowledge that a boy would get there would be as good as any ordinary experience he would go on a farm.

Mr. O'Ryan said he believed these "fountain pen" farmers were not much good. They might suit five or ten per cent. of the people, but not 90 per cent. The only place where they could get the proper experience was on their farms.

Chairman.—My experience of boys who go from farms to college is that they are not going back to the farm if they can get a job anywhere else.

Mr. Chairman.—There may be an opening for creamery managers on the lines suggested by Mr. Hartly.
