## Dungarvan Circuit Court

The business for the Dungarvan Circuit was opened in the Court-house on Wednesday last by Mr. Justice Sealy. There was a big number of cases on the list, many of which were, on the application of the solicitors engaged, adjourned to the next Court with a view to settlements.

**Cases Transferred.**—Mr. C. S. Quinlan, solicitor, Waterford, applied to his Lordship to have transferred for hearing from Kilkenny Circuit Court to Waterford Circuit Court, two cases in which the litigants live convenient to Waterford city.

**Dr. Counihan, State Solicitor, had a similar application, and all were granted.**  
**Application for a Lock-up Licence.**—Mr. Molloy, B.L. (instructed by Messrs. Farrell & Morrissey, solicitors), made application on behalf of Mrs. Julia Dempsey for a new licence in respect of her premises, No. 28, The Square, Dungarvan. Mr. Molloy said the application was for a licence for part of the premises for which applicant at present holds a licence for the whole of the premises. The premises have been altered structurally, and the first floor is to be a lady hair-dresser and the upper portion as flats. The valuation of the premises is £22 10s, and the present licence duty is £15 18s. 2d. The portion now to be licensed will be re-valued, and there will be a considerable reduction in licence duty.

**Mr. Hasset, B.E., submitted maps of the premises showing in detail the different portions and alterations.**

**Supt. O'Mahony said that any objection which he could offer would be as regards sanitary arrangements, there being no provision for women using the premises. He would prefer to see more accommodation, but agreed it would be very expensive. As far as the Gardai were concerned, the premises would now be more easy of supervision.**

**Mrs. Julia Dempsey bore out her counsel's statement as to alterations, letting, etc. of the premises, of which she is the licensee since the death of her husband in 1938.**

**His Lordship said it is a proper case to grant a new licence, and he ordered that a new licence is to issue.**

**Fencing on the Dunne v. Curran v. Keane.**—Mr. T. C. Williams, solicitor for plaintiff (Mr. M. Curran, Ballynacorney, Ring, and Mr. J. F. Keane, solicitor for defendant (Mr. P. Keane, Ballynacorney). Mr. Williams, solicitor, said that Mr. Kenny (for Mr. Keane) is under the misapprehension that the case was dismissed on the last day and that the case was struck out.

**Mr. Kenny agreed and said that he, on behalf of his client, had paid the costs and damages. His client was not notified to attend.**

**Michael Curran, plaintiff, in reply to Mr. Williams said he examined the fence that morning. It was not yet complete; there were two posts for a gateway and at the back of each there is a space of four feet. The gate is not hung but tied with wire to the post. Defendant has done nothing since the February Court, and there has been some trespass. The place does not require much to finish it. It could be done by one man in a day, but defendant won't surrender.**

**To Mr. Kenny, witness said it is news to him that Keane had paid the costs and damages.**

**His Lordship said that defendant must build up those gaps, and if the work is not completed before next Court he will be paying £50 damages.**

**Ring Co-operative Stores v. Walsh.**—Mr. Kenny, solicitor, on behalf of Mr. Liam Meehan, manager, Ring Co-op. Stores, sought a declaration from the Court to have a sum of £207 9s. amount of judgment got, well charged on the lands of John Walsh, Bezmagh, Dungarvan.
