

It should be noted, however, that Children's Allowances will only be payable as from the 1st August next.

Explanatory talks on the filling up of the claim form will be given from Radio Eireann at 10.30 p.m. on 28th April, at 9.45 p.m. on 1st May, and at 10.30 p.m. on 2nd May.

Barry Walsh, national organising secretary, Muintir Na Tire, spoke on the aims and work of the organisation. He outlined the method adopted by in the circumstances and habits of

Muintir Na Tire had never believed in hiding the fact that its intentions were to build a great christian and national organisation from these organised parish committees, and refused to believe that the welfare of the country people could be advanced by wishful thinking which failed to get down to practical action. Muintir Na Tire was an organisation of action, not of discussion, and its con-tinuance in any parish depended up-on the ability of the community to furnish the brains and brawn, the finance and the energy, the spirit of charity and co-operation to keep at work in the task of bettering the conditions of the rural people at home.

The main field of work for Muintir Na Tire lay at present in the organ-ising of the rural people and in the building up from the foundation of a great new social, educational and nomic organisation which would bring to the country people a sense of responsibility and a spirit of self-reliance and which would benefit them incalculably in many ways. In Muintir Na Tire they could lay their hands to any work hands to any work around them which needed to be done and which was not at present the concern of any particular group. They could assist and co-operate with other organisa-tions and they could devote special attention to the calling of agriculture and to the bringing of co-operative ideas into rural life.

Continuing, Mr. Barry Walsh said that he wished to emphasize that by the very nature of its aims and work Muintir Na Tire was an organisation which would have to remain in the field for a good many years, for it was designed to bring a permanent system into a sphere of life where none ever existed before. The parish guilds and councils of Muintir Na Tire were founded to become a permanent feature of parish life in every community, and it was only by persisting in their work that the members of the organisation could hope to tackle in the future as a body the big problems which would be placed in their path. Those who said that Muintir Na Tire was not needed in any parish or that it had no work to do were going through life with unseeing eyes for all around them lay the evidence that we in this country had neglected the building up of a christian social system. Nothing that the Dail or the political machinery devised could ever become completely successful until the people at home in their parishes woke up to their responsibilities and to the fact that they themselves had to take part in the government of a country. It was, therefore, as important for the people of a parish to take part in their Muintir Na Tire guild and council, as it was for them to participate in the political government of a country.
