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KILMACHTHOMAS COURT

(Held on Wednesday, before Mr. F. J. McCabe, D.J.) Messrs. E. Hill and Son, Ltd., and John Kent, two local licensed vintners, applied for and were granted a Beer Dealer's License.

C. Williams, solicitor, Dunganvan, outlined the circumstances which led to the breach, and added that it takes a very intelligent man in the fullness of his health to make such a mistake.

On ascertaining that the firm would pay the expenses entailed, the D.J. disposed of the case in favour of the G.O.A. Prosecuted by Garda M. Moloney, Leamybrien, a number of Comeraghs parents were fined sums ranging from 2/6 to 10/- for failing to keep their children regularly to school.
