DUNGARVAN CIRCUIT COURT

On Tuesday last Mr. Justice Sealy, K.C., opened the business of the Dunganarvan Circuit Court.

Transfers.—Mr. Quinlan, solicitor, Waterford, made application (due to travel restrictions) to his Lordship to have the hearing of two cases listed for the Kilkenny Circuit Court transferred to Waterford. The applications were granted.

Cum gratia Case Settled at Last.—Mr. T. C. Williams, solicitor, for plaintiff (Mr. Michael Curran, Ballynacorney, Ring), and Mr. J. F. Kenny, solicitor, for defendant (Mr. Patrick Keane, Ballynacorney).

Mr. Williams said that when the case was before the Court in June, 1943, an order was made for a decree for £50 to be reduced to £5 if the fence was completed before the next court. The case has since then been again before the court. His client, Mr. Curran, now says the fence is reasonably secure, although there is still some trespass. He (Mr. Williams) asked for a decree for a sum that would cover the costs and expenses of his client for coming here for the court.

His Lordship said that Mr. Williams' client certainly was put to a lot of inconvenience.

Mr. Kenny said this fence had cost his client £100 to protect a piece of land for plaintiff that is not worth two pence.

His Lordship allowed £2 for expenses and £1 for costs in addition to the decree for £5.

Fleming v. Merrigan.—This was a civil bill brought by Mrs. Mary Fleming, Reenboulis, Clonmore, seeking an injunction to restrain James and Hannah Merrigan from continuing to remain in the plaintiff's dwelling-house until they conduct themselves. Mr. Darcy, B.L. (instructed by Messrs. Farrell and Morrissey, solicitors) for plaintiff. There was no appearance for defendant.

Plaintiff, replying to Mr. Darcy, said that in 1934 her daughter, Hannah Merrigan and her husband, James Merrigan, came to reside with her. Her witness is 80 years old and has a farm of 120 acres, mostly mountain, with a little good land. Her daughter married Merrigan in 1934 and came to live with her for 12 months. They then left and went to reside with a Mr. McKenna. They came back to her in 1937. She then had an order for transfer from her husband. They are residing with her since 1937. Merrigan never does any work, and she prevented her from doing so. He ploughed last March. He threatened her with a sprong on account of a bag that was missing. He assaulted her later and she was taken to hospital. He moved him to the District Court last March, and was set to get rid of him.

Mr. P. J. Morrissey, solicitor, deposed to seeing the plaintiff personally and to asking for possession.

His Lordship granted the injunction sought, with a decree for £1, and allowed plaintiff the costs of the action.

SECURED TO A HURLING MATCH. £50 Claim for Assault and Battery from a Spectator.

This was a civil bill brought by Denis Murray, Tourin, a member of the Tourin Hurling Club, against Patrick McGrath, Camphire, for £50 for assault and battery committed on plaintiff by the defendant on the 15th March, 1944. Mr. McDonald, B.L. (instructed by Messrs. Farrell and Morrissey, solicitors) for plaintiff; Mr. Darcy, B.L. (instructed by Messrs. A. Carroll and Co., solicitors) for defendant.

Denis Murray, Tourin, plaintiff, replying to Mr. McDonald, said he is a farmer and is 23 years old. He is a member of the Tourin Hurling Club that played Camphire in the Sportsfield, Cappoquin, on March 15th. A son of the defendant's played on the Camphire team right full forward. Witness was not playing near defendant's son. During the game witness broke his hurley and got one from Patrick Cunningham, the hon. secretary of the Cappoquin Club. The game, which was fairly rough, ended without incident, and witness handed back the hurley to Cunningham. As he was going towards the dressing room he noticed that he was being followed by a man who was running towards him. He was unable to help. His nose is very sore yet, and he finds it difficult to sleep at night. Witness knew the defendant, who is a shopkeeper, his land and deals in fish. He is about 50 years old and is known as a great bully. He has been charged and fined for an assault on a Guard.

To Mr. Darcy, witness said that when the game ended he was walking up the field and went to see that witness Michael Mason before. Mason is all right, but a bit of a "cafter." He could not say why Mason would come to court and swear he saw defendant strike plaintiff.
