At a meeting of the above, held at the C.Y.M.S., Cappoquin, on Sunday last, August 20th, at 8.15 p.m., Mr. M. Connors, Chairman, presided. Also present were: D. Sullivan, Vice-Chairman; P. Ryan and J. Fives, Co. Board and T. A. Kyne, Secretary; M. V. O'Donoghue, Co. Board Chairman was also present. A good number of delegates from clubs attended. The minutes were taken as read on a proposal of P. Ryan's seconded by J. Fives. P. Moloney raised the question of the referee's report made on the last match at Aghis. After a short discussion the matter dropped the Chairman remarking that referees were expected to report on the stewarding and general conditions at venues. Suspension.—Arising out of the report postponed from the previous meeting a member of Eire Oge Junior Club was suspended for two years. Objection and Counter Objection.—Lismore H.C. Club objected to Camphire H.C. being awarded the junior championship game, played at Cappoquin. Camphire counter objected to Lismore. Both clubs asked the Board for permission to withdraw the objections and agree to replay the game at Cappoquin on Sept. 10th. Match awarded to Blackwater Rowers.—Glenlickey Rowers failed to hold out at Villierstown on Sunday last and on the hearing of the report the Chairman awarded the match to Blackwater Rowers. M. Cunningham for Glenlickey Rowers said they did not get sufficient notice and as they had an appeal in to the Co. Board they should have been heard at a Co. Board meeting. The Secretary gave particulars of notifying them on Tuesday and informing them the Sunday before that appeal was ruled out of order by the Co. Board Chairman. Mr. O'Connor, in awarding the game to the Blackwater Rowers said he was satisfied Glenlickey Rowers knew they should play on Sunday but they simply refused to turn out and thus deserved losing the game. Dungarvan District Court.

Held on Tuesday before Mr. S. J. Troy, D.J. Undeclared Civil Bills.—The Court first dealt with a number of undeclared civil bills in which decrees were given in all cases. Complainants were Liam and V. Morrissey, O'Connell Street; J. J. Crotty, Squire; Paul I. Power, Brewery; and David Power, O'Connell Street. Messrs. P. J. Morrissey, T. C. Williams and A. R. Farrell were the solicitors concerned. Ejectment Orders.—Mrs. Mary Egan, Hotel, O'Connell Street, was granted a decree for possession of a house her property in O'Connell St., let at a weekly rent of 3/-.

Mrs. Bridget Moloney, Durrow, represented by Mr. J. F. Kenny, solicitor, sought an ejectment order against Mrs. Quill Pike, Dungarvan, in respect of premises let to defendant at a weekly rent of 4/-. Mr. Williams, Solicitor, appeared for defendant. Mr. Kenny, opening the case, said that the defendant, Mrs. Quill, occupies two premises at the Pike, Dungarvan. She, herself, resides in the Pike House and her husband occupies a house near by. The owner of this latter house is a young woman, now Mrs. Moloney, who resides with her aunt at Durrow. Her aunt, Mrs. Sexton, gave Mrs. Moloney this house as a 14th anniversary gift. The letting question about this house is a bit obscure and the case to determine whether tenancy existed, was before Judge Sealy at the last Circuit Court and they failed, the judge holding that there was a tenancy, and that Mrs. Sexton, the applicant's aunt had reduced the rent from 7/8 to 4/- on condition that a large bedroom in the house be reserved for her use. This case in his opinion will be decided on the greater hardship clause in the Act. Notice to quit was served on defendant on 18th July. Mr. Kenny then handed in correspondence which passed between the parties relative to the case. Mr. M. Hassett, B.E., replying to Mr. Kenny said he prepared the map of the Pike house (produced). There are three bedrooms upstairs. Witness then enumerated the room on the ground floor and said there is a great amount of space wasted on ground floor. The large centre bedroom upstairs could with little cost be divided into two fair-sized bedrooms. A store on the ground floor used for oil could be used for furniture. At present one on storage of bottles and the oil could be stored in a house in the yard. The present bottle store or the lounge could be converted into a bedroom.

Mr. Williams conversed said he is not suggesting that it is like the Shelbourne Hotel. His suggestion is that one bedroom be divided by a partition and one store on the ground floor be converted into a bedroom. He agrees it is pretty hard to get material at the present time to make any changes. Those changes if carried out might not be ideal for a family of eleven, but they would have better accommodations than many other families. He agrees that this arrangement would not be in keeping with modern housing conditions. Mr. M. Moloney said the plaintiff (his wife) is owner of the house occupied by Mr. Quill. Witness is a farmer and owns about 200 yards from this house. Durrow, where his wife lives is 9 miles away. He has to cycle there every night and morning but some nights it too tired after a day's work, he stays with his parents. It is impossible to get a house in the locality or in Dungarvan. To Mr. Williams—The house in question contains two small and one large bedroom and an attic. Mrs. Quill said she was owner of a licensed premises at Ballynacmague. She is also tenant of a small house from applicant at 4/- a week. She has 11 children ranging in ages from 6 to 25 years. Three of those are not residing there but return on holidays or weekends. The remaining eight were four boys, ages, 18, 11, 9 and 6, respectively, and four girls, ages, 18, 16, 12 and 8 years. Two of the children live with her on the licensed premises and the other six reside with her husband in the other house. To Mr. Kenny—Witness said that even if Mrs. Sexton required the large bedroom in the other house, witness would still have the use of the two other bedrooms and the attic left for her husband and children. Mr. Kenny said that if Mrs. Quill had to take her husband and children back to the licensed house there might be a bit of hardship through overcrowding but his clients suffer from hardship too and the question to decide is which is the greater hardship. Mr. Williams said it was a thousand times a greater hardship to impose overcrowding, and unsanitary conditions on a large family, than to ask a healthy young man of 28 years like Moloney to cycle 8 or 9 miles.
