The people of Dungarvan were appalled and indignant when they learned early on Thursday morning that a young soldier, Pte. Charles Daly (20), unmarried, of Clara. Tullamore, Co. Offaly, had been brutally done to death in one of the streets of the town on Wednesday night. He was the victim of an attack by, it is stated, two civilians, who assaulted him, it is understood, with sticks, causing severe head injuries. to

bim, it is understood, with sticks, causing severe head injuries, to which he succumbed shortly afterwards in the Dungarvan Hospital.

The tragedy occurred about 10.30 on Wednesday night on the street at present unlighted leading from the Square to the quays, usually unfrequented at that time. The crime, at the time of writing, is surrounded by mystery as no apparent motive by mystery, as no apparent motive has yet been advanced to account

has yet been advanced to account for it.

From details to hand it appears that the deceased and another soldier were coming from the quays and had reached the top of the street. Suddenly two civilians, armed with sticks, it is stated, rushed up behind them and attacked them. The full brunt of the assault was, apparently, directed against Private Daly, who fell to the ground, his head covered with blood. The other soldier, who was also struck but not seriously injured, raised the alarm and ran for assistance. The attackers, in the meantime, made off immediately. When help arrived it was found that the young man's condition was very grave, and spiritual and medical aid was sought. A few minutes later Rev. P. Farrell, C.C., Dungarvan, arrived on the scene and anointed the dying man, following which he was removed to the Hospital, where he died shortly after admission.

It is understood that some men were brought to the Garda Barvacks on Thursday morning for questioning, but up to the present there has been no arrest. Chief Supt. F. J. O'Reilly, Waterford, assisted by Supt. M. O'Mahony, Dungarvan, are in charge of the investigations.

On Thursday morning a deputation from the Dungarvan Urban Council, consisting of Messrs. T. McCarthy (Chairman), M. Morrissey, T.D., and Mr. M. 

WHEAT, BARLEY, OATS. I CAN ARRANGE THE DRAWING OF ABOVE BY LORRY AS LAST YEAR.


