of Private Charles Daly. Dr. James McGrath, State Pathologist, said he performed a post-mortem on the body of Private Charles Daly at the District Hospital. The body was identified by Private Jas. Lowe. Witness was assisted by Dr. Cusack, Dungarvan, and Lieut. Lydon. The body was that of a very well-built man, weighing from 12 to 13 stones, and six feet in height. There were two wounds on the back on the head, somewhat to the left side, and a deep somewhat to the left side, and a deep bruise behind the left ear. The skin over one wound and over the bruise showed abrasions, with almost linear edges, about one inch wide. Blood was coming from the nose, mouth and left ear. There were several fractures of the skull, mainly under the two

of the skull, mainly under the two wounds and the deep bruises mentioned. The factures fell into two separate groups at the base of the skull. They extended up the back of the skull and along the base of the skull, through the inner bones of the left ear and to the bone over the nose. There was marked haemorrhage on the surface and base of the brain. All the other organs were examined and were found to be normal. L. A. Veale, M. F. Walsh, M. Harty, and M. Morrissey, T.D. The following who were also present, represented the teaching profession: Rev. Fr. Magee, Rector, Augustinian College; Rev. Bro. Murray, Superior Christian Brothers Schools, do.; and Mr. M. Brennock, Secretary, Waterford I.N.T.O. Mr. T. B. Boyle, Acting Secretary, was also present.

Secretary, was also present. VIEWS OF REPRESENTATIVES. The Chairman said that they had with them representatives of the teaching profession who would give their views on the memorandum from the Department in connection with the formulation of scholarships schemes. He was sure that these would be very helpful to the members in arriving at the formulation of

Rev. Fr. Magee said that as it had now become law, having their views on it would not affect as nothing could be done about it now. Education was now State controlled; the epartment had taken over practically everything in education. In the report of the Vocational Organ-isation Commission the view was expressed that this was a definitely dangerous step. This was the same view as that given by the secondary teachers last year. He presumed, however, that they could make some slight changes in the scheme.

Mr. Brennock said that they were

entitled to vary such as the number of scholarships and the amounts.
He would suggest that they go
through the different sections at first and see what could be done. As regards the Means Test, he would say definitely, there should be no Means Test. That, however, had now become law and it could not be changed but at the same time he would not be in favour of it. Mr. Morrissey pointed out that they in Waterford were higher than many other counties both as regards

Rev. Fr. Magee said that they were extraordinary generous. When compared to Co. Cork they could see that the income required there was £156 and the valuation, £56. He thought that they were rather generous compared to that.
Following further discussion it was agreed to recommend to the Co. Council that the basic salary and valuation be £300 and £70 respectively, for the parents of one child, with rises of £5 in respect of valuation and £20 in respect of income for every additional child. NUMBER AND VALUE OF

The matter of the number and of the scholarships was next taken, Mr. Morrissey suggesting that the number be increased to 10.

Rev. Fr. Magee said that he considered the sum of £25 for scholarships to Boarding Schools was too low, but he would suggest that they be increased to £40. The whole system was as far as he could see against the country boy.

The Acting Secretary explained that the scholarship scheme at present was £20 for a scholarship winder the scholarship winder from the scholarsh

ner living four miles from the nearest secondary school and £25 for a boy or girl living outside that dis-A suggestion by Mr. Morrissey that the number of scholarships be increased to ten and that the value be £25 for a successful pupil whose parents lived within 4 miles

of a secondary school; £30 from 4 to 8, and £35 for distance over 8 scholarships for certain classes of candidates, Rev. Fr. Magee said that he was opposed to putting secondary and primary pupils on the same basis. As far as he knew—with two exceptions—all scholarship winners had been pupils of secondary schools. Mr. Brennock said he favoured the equal division of the scholarships— half to the town and half to the country. The town schools had a decided advantage over the rural schools and for that reason dividing the scholarships equally would be

The meeting agreed to recommend to the Co. Council that five scholarships be reserved for two teacher schools and five with over two

It was decided that the existing regulations regarding the University scholarships remain unchanged with the exception that an "Exhibition Clause" be included.

Regarding the recommendation from the Committee of Agriculture that provision be made for the inclusion of a scholarship in the faculty of Agriculture, Mr. Harty pointed out that there was no faculty of Agri-culture in Cork University but that to suggest that they recommend a scholarship in Veterinary Science. He quoted from the report on Voca-tional Education in this respect in which it was stated that it was a strange anomaly that in an agricultural country such as Ireland no provision had been made by any county for a scholarship in Veterinary
