A.T. & G.W. UNION (DUNGARVAN
BRANCH).
 The Editor, "Dungarvan Observer."
 Dear Sir,—For the information of
 the general public I would like to give
 an outline of the dispute between the
 Union and the Dickens Leather Co.,
 Dungarvan. In January of this year
 both the Union and the Company be-
 came members of the Joint Industrial
 Council for the leather industry.
 under a Department chairman. The
 Union undertook that no unofficial
 deadlock would be allowed, thus sav-
 ing a vital industry for the nation.
 Should a dispute arise the
 Union undertook to go through all the
 machinery of the Council before a
 deadlock was admitted. When the
 deadlock came a further four weeks
 were to be given to the Government
 Department concerned to try and
 settle the matter. If after the four
 weeks the dispute was not settled the
 Union undertook to allow in safety
 men to save the products from spoil-
 ing, so there would be no loss. All
 undertakings have been carried out
 in spirit and in letter.
 The sum total of the dispute is that
 the Union members refuse to work
 with a number of the members who
 although they joined the Union and
 received all the benefits the Union
 secured for the tangery workers, re-
 fuse to pay their contributions. The
 Union ask that the Company should
 give an undertaking that all men who
 are not or refuse to become Union
 members be not employed. There are
 certain exceptions agreed on by the
 Union to this request, such as non-
 manual foremen and confidential
 clerks. The Company refuse to give
 this undertaking, and hence the
 strike.
