The scarcity of bicycles and the difficulty of obtaining tyres again prevented many young people from the surounding areas from enrolling. The enrolment could, however, be regarded as satisfactory in view of the abnormal conditions which prevailed. A special effort should be made to strengthen the boys' section and re-establish the second year Junior Technical Course. The courses of study were care-The courses of study were carefully planned to suit local needs and included appropriate practical training for both boys and girls. A good average attendance was maintaned in the Domestic Economy and Commercial classes. The instruction was sound and efficient and very definite progress was made by the students.

The boys' class was slow to build up due to the lateness of the harvest season and the attendance towards the end of the session was adversely effected by the demands for labour for food and fuel production. The efficiency of both practical and general subjectes was quite satisfactory and reasonable progress was recorded by these students who attended regularly.
Adult evening classes were organised in Irish, Domestic Economy, Engineering, Woodwork, Chemistry and Art and approximately 250 students were enrolled, which represented an increase of over 80 on the enrolment

of the previous session. The enrolments in all classes were satisfactory. The Domestic Economy section was again particularly strong with a total of over 100 students. Instruction in the renovation and repair of worn or broken articles was a feature of the work in all practipreciated. The construction of windoperated house lighting plants was again an important branch of the work in the engineering class. Several such plants were constructed by students from the rural areas and light in their homes. The attendance in general was satisfactory and good work was accomplished in all

Cappoquin.—The usual day courses were provided. The total enrolment of 36 (16 boys and 20 girls) was about the same as that of the previous session. The Boys' class was slightly bigger, but the girls' section, particularly the first year class, was weak. A satisfactory average attendance was maintained except for a period after Easter when the services of many of the students were required for tillage work. There was no change in the curriculum and, as heretofore, practical training in all branches of household mangement for girls and in woodwork and rural science for boys formed the bulk of the work. Instruction in general subjects was continued in the three classes and elementary commercial work was included in the programme for 2nd year girls. Changes caused by the resignation of two instructresses during the session upset the sequence of the work in the Domestic Economy classes.
