LICENSING CASES.
Held on Tuesday before Mr. S. J. Troy, D.J.

Occasional Licenses.—Mr. Williams, Solr, applied on behalf of Mr. P. L. Power for occasional licenses on the nights of January 10th (Garda Benevolent Dance), February 9th (National and Commercial Club Dance).

Licensing Cases.—Supt. O'Mahony charged Joseph A. Power, O'Connell Street, with a breach of the Licensing Laws, on Sunday, December 3rd. Fourteen men found on the premises were also prosecuted.

The Superintendent said that there was a hurling match (Four County League) in the town that day and the rumour was prevalent that an area exemption order was applied for. This publican opened his premises as a result.

Guard Enright said that this was correct. Mr. Kenny, Solr, for the defendant, said he pleaded a genuine mistake; the door was opened and the barmaid thought that the exemption order was in force.

The Justice agreed and said he would adjourn the case for three months and if there is no breach in the meantime the case will be dismissed.

The Superintendent said that prior to 1943, the Guards should apply for an exemption order but now it is up to the publicans to apply themselves.

Mrs. M. A. Halpin, Cross Bridge Street, was also charged with a breach of the Licensing Laws at 10.45 p.m. on Christmas Eve.

Guard Beagley gave evidence of finding four men on the premises. The case was dismissed.

Supt. O'Mahony charged Mrs. Alice O'Connor, Abbeyside, with a breach of the Licensing Laws on Christmas Eve and five men found on the premises were also summoned.

Guard Burke gave evidence of entering the premises at 11.50 a.m. and finding the men in the bar. The publican said they were old customers and she could not refuse them.

Mr. Kenny, Solr, for defendant, appealed for leniency and suggested a fine would meet the case. He explained that one of the men was a brother of the girl working on the premises, another man helps in the shop and at bottling.

The Superintendent said he did not wish to press the case but would state that as regards refusing customers, this publican was in the happy position that she does not have on the premises.

The Guards visited other publichouses and found them empty.

The Justice, imposing a penalty of £2 not to be recorded, said defendant was getting off lightly and if she does not take warning is in breach of the law. The men found on the premises were each fined 5/-.

Sequel to Accident at Killosera.—Superintendent O'Mahony prosecuted Joseph Byrne, Dysert, Ard-na-Grove, Ardmore, and Decian Regan, Shanakill, Ring, under the Road Traffic Act (Section 51). The case was a sequel to an accident at Killosera on the evening of December 19th, 1944.

Guard Farrell said he investigated the accident. It was a very wet day and the road was very wet. When he arrived he found a pony trap turned up on its right wheel.

The nearest point of the wheel was two feet from the left or proper side of the road. He then described the damage to the trap.

Both Byrne and Regan came to the barracks to report the accident and to bring a statement from both. He was a mark 2 feet 10 inches on the left side of the lorry. The width of the road at the point is 23 feet from fence to fence.

To Mr. T. C. Williams who represented Joseph Byrne, witness said Byrne was perfectly sober. Regan was slightly drunk but was not drunk.

To Mr. Morrissey, Solr, who represented Regan, witness said Regan was not present when Byrne made his statement.

LATE MR. PATRICK DUNFORD, BOHADOON, DUNGARVAN.

The death took place at his residence, Bohadoon, Dungarvan, on Sunday evening last of Mr. Patrick Dunford, to the great regret of his wife, family and large circle of friends. The deceased, one of nature's gentlemen, one of the most industrious and practical farmers in West Waterford, was held in the highest regard by all with whom he came in contact, due to his unfailing kindness and his integrity in all his dealings. His numerous friends deeply regret his passing and the deepest sympathy is felt for his bereaved wife and family. A very large and representative attendance from all over the county attended at the removal of the remains to the Parish Church, Kilgobnet, on Monday evening, following which interment was received by Very Rev. H. Conway, P.P., assisted by Rev. Mee, O'Meara, C.W., and Rev. Fr. Hickey, C.C. On Tuesday Requiem Office and High Mass was celebrated by the Rev. Fr. Hickey, assisted by eight other clergy, following which interment was made in the family plot adjoining the Church in the presence of another big cortege of mourners and friends.

The immediate family mourners were: Mrs. Dunford (widow); Patrick (son); Bridget and Mrs. J. Hickey, Kilbrien (daughters); Dan, Robin and John Dunford (brothers); J. Hickey (son-in-law). Many Mass cards, letters and messages of sympathy were received by the family.
