Knockboy Ogham Shows.—The Ogham shows, built into the walls of the old church at Kilmacthomas, were recently made secure at the expense of the county at large. On the tombstones which may date from the fifth century, was in particular danger owing to the fall of a tree of the supporting nursery. The inscription on this stone reads: "Máthair mhóir gorta Sárghaibh, which means that the man's name was Máthair in modern spelling, and that he belonged to a family of the name which claimed descent from the Celtic war-god Sárghaibh. It is not just a coincidence that men of the name are still being buried at Kilmacthomas for a good many years past. The other hand tombstones require a little attention every few years or so, and these stones are the property of the Co. Cork Club. It is legally bound to maintain them. The Council may, however, accept contributions of money towards the cost of the work. It is a matter of moment under its care, so that bearers of the patronymic or other interested persons wish to contribute there is nothing to prevent them doing so.
