ANOTHER COURT SEQUEL TO NIRE AGRARIAN TROUBLE

CLAIM FOR BURNING OF HAY-

agrarian trouble in the Nire Valley district last year when at the Dungaryan Circuit Court, before am came before him for the malious burning of a hayshed last

The claim was made by Mrs. Bridge! Tobin, Glendaloughin, Bally-macarbery, mother of John Tobin, the purchaser of a farm in that area February, 1944, which led to ceran incidents later in the year as a call of which five farmers from Ballymacarbery were sentenced last february by Judge Sealy at Water-lard for riot and assault. It will be availed that subsequently the court proceedings gave rise to a protest resolution by the Waterford County ouncil concerning remarks passed by Judge Sealy on that occasion re-garding Right Rev Dean Byrne, D.D., P.P., Clonmel, a letter from the Dean to the Press, a statement from Judge Sealy from the Bench at Nenagh, and, nnally, court proceedings against a member of the Waterford Co. Council and a Waterford journalist.
