

Proposed Tramore School.—The
Department wrote that they were of
opinion that the Committee could not at present, undertake to provide a new school at Tramore. The arrangements made for providing new schools at Kilmacthomas and Portlaw in the post-war period will require nearly all the additional income available from the increased rating provisions of the Vocational (Amendment) Act, 1944. The Committee should, however, review its financial position.

In a statement by Mr. J. Lanigan, C.E.O. regarding the Department's suggestion to review the financial position of the Committee, he said that under the provisions of Section (4) 2 of the Vocational Educational (Amendment Act, 1944, the maximum rate may be increased to 5d. in the £. This would bring a local contribution increase of £1,488, with an equivalent increase in the Department's contributions, making a total without them.


