

Mr. Delany said that the area cvered was from Ballymackee to Nire Cross, about a mile long, and the same depth. There was a good source of supply, for all the wells were in the high levels, but there were a lot of faults, too, for a number of the wells discharged into an open drain, and cattle, especially during this time, stayed in them all clay long. In reply to their first letter they got a long circular stating the amount of charges for different classes of people in other schemes. This reply looked to him as if it was just fooling the people. County Manager—Were they using the bad water? Can you prove that?

Mr. Delany—We cannot prove it, but we can deduce it from the things that occurred. It seems very likely. There is plenty of water and ample pressure from a well about 800 feet high

The County Manager said that about two years ago there was an application from the Parish Council. It was put on the post-war schemes and the estimate made by Mr. Doyle was £2,400. The scheme was put low in the order of priority by the County M.O.H. That did not show that it was very urgent or that the typhoid was due to bad water

Mr. Doyle, assistant county surveyor, explained the position there, and pointed out that seven miles of piping would be required. About 7 or 8 years ago there was a smaller scheme, but this other scheme was more ambitious, and they would have to go further afield. He could not say off-hand if the source of supply had been measured, but from his own personal knowledge of the springs there would not be enough to meet the requirements of the present application.

To Mr. McGrath, he said this scheme would cost about £10,000, and the old scheme £2,400. Mr. Heskin—Mr Delany said something about a well 800 feet high. Are you aware of that?

Mr. Doyle—I don't know it.

The Chairman said Mr. Delany was one of the largest ratepayers in the county. He had ample supply of water himself, but he was prepared to help in paying for a supply of water to this particular area.
