THE TEACHERS' WORK.

In a previous issue we dealt with the question of the value of the teachers' work. It is left to the reader to decide for himself when he has thought over the facts.

The question of remuneration must naturally follow the question of the value of the work. Before one can say that the work is worth this or that amount several vital points must be examined. First of these is, we think, the importance of the work to the children. Except for a negligible few, every child in the State is taught by the primary teachers.

Our industrial and agricultural methods appear to be generally sound and successful. All this must be the result of native ability properly educated in the literal sense of the word. Those who gave this education, then, have conferred a gift of great value on our people.

There, without exaggeration, we have the gift to our people and the cost to the donors. How then shall we recompense them? The standard of remuneration in other places may be used as a guide. In England, to-day, those in similar positions are in receipt of salaries almost double those for Irish teachers, and this not including a substantial war bonus.
