EXTRACTS FROM "THE ANNALS OF YOUGHAL."

1837—The Clock Cage, used so long as the thoroughbred, being considered defective in several of the accommodations essential to the health of the prisoners, was condemned by the Inspector of Prisons in the following report:

1834—The Youghal branch of the Bank of Ireland was opened. 1834—The Commissioners of Public Instruction (First Report 106 c) made the following return of the population of the Youghal Parish: Youghal—Roman Catholics, 9,670; Established Church, 1,810; Protestant Dissenters, 100; total number of inhabitants, 11,580.

1837—During this year the trade of Youghal was as follows:—Nine ships, having a burden of 17,170 tons, entered the port, with 1,433 tons of timber from the British settlements in North America; and 440 colliers, with a burden of 37,400 tons, brought from England 27,680 tons of coal and 20,995 tons of culm. There were exported: 107,090 quarters of oats; 23,288 quarters of barley; 4,921 quarters of barley; 9,388 sacks of flour (84 cwt. to each); 1,013 cows; 5,220 pigs; 880 sheep; 2,718 bales of bacon; 9,990 firkins and 136 kegs of butter.

1829—By July, The Hon. GEORGE PONSONBY was chosen representative of Youghal.

1829—The Devonshire Arms Hotel was built at the south end of the town adjoining the site of the Franciscan Abbey. In order to form sufficient room for the building, with its yards and stables, considerable excavations were made at the base of the hill, and large rocks were carried out. Such remnants of the ancient Abbey as had survived the building of the Chapel of Ease, in 1817, were now wholly removed, and many curious tombs were destroyed, the cemetery being thrown into gardens, a mass of poor cottages, inhabited chiefly by brogue-makers, and called from its forbidding and gloomy aspect HELL, was cleared away, and the road opened up to the town.

1829—The late Mr. Ed. Power, Windyap, Carrick-on-Suir, Co. Wexford, was a nephew of the late Very Rev. Provoost Power, Glasgow Archdeacon, and a cousin of Rev. D. Power, P.P., Rathmore. Rev. M. Power, C.C., Clonmel; Rev. Denis Power, C.C., Dungarvan. He was one of the best known farmers in the Co. Waterford.

Robbery at Youghal—During the week the premises of the Youghal Steam Laundry Co. at Mill Road, Youghal, were forcibly entered, and the following articles were missing: Ten blankets, one pair trousers and a quantity of loose furniture covers.

Next meeting of the board was fixed for Wednesday, September 19th, at Youghal at 1 o'clock (P.M.). Inspector Brien has been submitting his last report of the total number of salmon killed by rods, nets and spears, amounting to 2,270, weighing 25,481 lb. In addition, 100 salmon, weighing 1,772, weighing 9,199 lb, were taken. These figures show a decrease in salmon and gillie of almost 9,000 lb, for the month of May and June. The average weight of the salmon killed was 11 lb, and the gillies 5 lb. Rod anglers killed about 120 salmon, in the six calendar months at Carysville only 95 salmon were taken during May and June. On the whole rod and net fishing has been disappointing since the season began on the 1st February. The fishing on fishery duty on the river Gradeny I observed that the urine of the pig farm, the property of the Mitcheltown Co-operative Creamery, was flowing into it. A short time before the fishing was received a report that a number of Ardmore and Ardmore trout were dead in the vicinity of this mill. Effluent of this kind would, in my opinion be detrimental to fish life, especially in warm spell of weather. The clerk of the Fisheries Department was directed to write to the Youghal Co-operative Creamery, and draw their attention to the fact that the effluent of this kind would be injurious to the fish life. The Youghal Co-operative Creamery visited the Mitcheltown area with a view to having erected a two-ton grating at the tail race of the mill. Owing to the scarcity of material this grating will not be possible of erection until next year. Approximately 900 feet of grating is required for this grating. When the grating is in position pebble salmon will be unable to enter the tail race. During the spring freshets in May a number of illegal weirs were removed from the lower reaches of the River Bride. Owing to unsuitable tides during 1944 this work had to be abandoned. The whole of the tide-way is now clear of any obstruction. While on duty the waterkeepers repaired several nets in the area. A number of prosecutions for breach of a bye-law will be heard at the next court at Youghal on July 24th. The fishery patrol launch will be valued ashore at the end of July when it will be necessary to carry out due overhaul of the engine. The necessary parts have been supplied by the makers through the Department of Fisheries. A pair of binoculars has been purchased for use of the waterkeeper operating the launch. The markman at Youghal has killed a number of seals since Ardmore. The pests have increased lately. The Minister for Defence has kindly loaned the Board a service rifle as our own is undergoing repairs. Signed, J. J. Kenny, Inspector.

LISMORE DISTRICT. Mr. R. C. Annesley, Chairman, presided at the quarterly meeting of the above board held at the Devonshire Arms Hotel, Tallow. Other members present were:—Miss G. Having read the minutes of last meeting, same was duly signed. Correspondence was dealt with and included acknowledgments of expressions of sympathy tendered from previous meetings, and of the motion of Mr. J. E. Daly, B.E. a vote of sympathy was passed to Mr. J. L. Keane, solicitor, Youghal, on his recent sad bereavement, with which the Clerk and Inspector desired to be associated.

On the motion of Mr. G. Fitzgerald, it was unanimously agreed that statistics pertaining to all districts be compiled covering a period of years, and the Inspector was requested and agreed to carry out the work.

Members discussed at length the question of outstanding rates referred to in letter from the Department of Fisheries, and decision on same was adjourned to next meeting of board.

On the motion of Mr. Dunne, Youghal, it was unanimously agreed that a communication should be addressed to the Department requesting that steps should be taken with a view to establishing a curing station at Youghal, and that the Sea Fisheries Association should be invited to advise and encourage the taking of pollack which abounded in shoals and shoals of Youghal Harbour by the Youghal fishermen with a view to preserving the salmon fishery, as the terrific destruction of salmon fry each season, was attributable to the immense shoals of pollack which, so many speak, devoured the fry on their way to the sea.

It was also unanimously agreed that the Department be requested to procure the issue of larger supplies of cartridges for use of the large flocks of cormorants on the upper and lower reaches of the river. Instructions were also issued to the Clerk to communicate with the Ministry of Justice and Commissioner of the Garda requesting that extra Garda be allocated to these districts where required to see to the protection of the spawning fish during the spawning season.
