Mr. Duggan.-Why not take on extra hands? Mr. Quirk.-I suggest that the men who are taken off the dole be bled weekly. Chairman.-If any alteration is being made, do the whole lot. Mr. Kyne.-Do not Corporations pay weekly? Deputy County Manager.-Corporation payments are made by cash, but Mr. Kyne-I suggest that the reason they could not be paid weekly is that you are not willing to break the procedure.

In the Secretary's report on the matter it was stated the change would cost 2,956. He would not, therefore, recommend any departure from the existing system.

Mr. Kyne said that the statements that had been made would not be accepted by him as corroborative evidence that it could not be done. He would suggest that no attempt had been made to examine the possibility. It could be adjourned to the next meeting when he would be able to bring in rebuttal evidence.

Chairman.-It would be as well to defer it so. Mr. Kyne.-It will have to be done. It might reach a time when the workers will not work for the U.S.A. The matter was adjourned.

"Closer to Fasadh, State."-Mr. Kyne made reference to a recent letter sent to all employees of the council which he said, deprived them of their rights to bring any grievance or complaint they might have to their representatives under threat of dismissal. They had to sign it.

The Deputy County Manager said it was a copy of a circular from the Department and sent to each officer, who were asked to acknowledge receipt of it.

Mr. Kyne.-So that he could sign it or it could be held in evidence against him. Well, I'm protesting against it.

At this juncture some of the members asked to have the circular read, stating that they had heard nothing about it.

The County Secretary read the letter, which stated that the "growing practice of officers of local authorities making representations through public representatives concerning their remuneration duties and conditions of service." The letter, after stating that a definite intimation should be given to each officer that he or she was to be held liable to disciplinary action. The letter concluded by saying that an officer aggrieved by a decision of a local body, can appeal to the Minister.

Mr. Kyne-I disagree with a statement. There is a list of organised workers in Tallow. I am proud of the fact that they are a right-shoulder in every area.

Chairman.-We have no all at that. We did not appoint the County Council. I decided to adjourn to the next meeting. Mr. Kyne pointed out that a quorum membership was required.

During the discussion on the sub-committee Mr. O'Ryan said he held representing the County Council. Mr. O'Ryan, "the inter-labouring man at heart as loyal to them as any other man yield to the suggestion of the Chairman, to put the matter on the agenda for discussion at the annual meeting of the County Council Officers' Association.

A second resolution requesting the Department to exercise ordinary courtesy in replying to the committee's correspondence was also passed.
