3 MONTHS FOR NEGLECTING

John Quirke, Leagh, Ring, brought civil bill for £25 against James Power, hotel porter, Dungarvan, made up of £16 10s., the price of cattle, and the balance £8 10s. being damages for loss sustained by the failure of the defendant to deliver presented the


