BUILDING OF A BRIDGE AT CAPPOQUIN.

JUDGE SEALY'S DECISION.

At Clonmel Circuit Court, budge Sealy, the Minister for L the use of a bridge, the property of the plaintiff, and situated adjacent to a plot called "The Daffodil Field,"

Mr. D'Arcy, B.L. (instructed by Mr. J. J. Counihan, S.S., Waterford) appeared for the plaintiff, and Mr. McGuire, B.L. (instructed by Mr. T. A. Riordan, solr., Mallow) for the de-

Mr. McGuire said that his client, Peter Griffin, claimed this plot of land by reason of the fact that when he bought the land he was shown this garden as part of his conveyance that he used this garden for grow affodils, and that it was used by him for such from 1922 onwards.

Patrick Lyons, Land Commission inspector, said the place in dispute was situated about two miles from Cappoquin, in a wood.

Giving evidence as to the building of the Department's bridge, witness

was asked was there any reason why
the bridge had been put in this spot.
He replied that it was the best point
to build a bridge.
William Donegan said he was the
forester of Glenshellaun Wood. He knew the part of the river close to defendants' house. The old bridge there was carried away last October. and on instructions he set about uilding a new bridge. The object in building the bridge was to get to the woods or! the other side of the river. When he was building the bridge Mr. Griffin came out and protested against the bridge going up. From the time that the Department took

the place over in 1942 the field near the bridge was under a heavy crop Mr. McGuire—When he protested it was his property, what did you tell him?—I told him that I had instructions to carry on with the bridge and that it was the Department's property. It was the Department that had given me the instructions to build the bridge

Mr. McGuire-Regardless of what claim a citizen was making.

Judge Sealy—Had you much re-ourse to this place?—Yes, I had men Joseph F. O'Keeffe said he knew the woods since 1936. He bought tim-ber from the Keane estate. He knew Griffin's house and the bridge that used to be across the river and that was carried away by the floods last October. He had erected that bridge in 1936. When he went there first there were a couple of old stakes across the river—it couldn't be called a bridge. He knew the piece of land on the left-hand side of the river

on the left-hand side of the river called "the daffodil garden." When he was putting his bridge across the river he could see it. When asked what condition it was in, witness said that it seemed to be in a very bad condition always. There were patches where there weren't briars, but all over it was a very neglected place. He did not see any change in

the place until the bridge question came up. There were daffodils growing in the bushes there.

Judge Sealy—Did you ever see anybody in the garden there! —No, I can't say I did. Referring to the lime when witness built the first bridge, His Lordship asked if he had any definite idea

about who owned the plot.
Witness-No, there was never any necessity for me. Patrick Morrissey, a workman for the Department of Lands, said he enew the wood since last September. From what he could see of the plot, it was a mass of briars and a tangle of undergrowth. There were no signs of cultivation

Mr. J. Lenihan said he had lived around the district for the last 25 to 30 years. He knew the plot known as "the dafforil garden" since last When the witness told his Lordship that the Keane sisters were

living in the house previous to Mr. Judge Sealy asked if they were sisters of Sir John, and witness replied that they were not.

Mr. J. Bowen, E.E., Fermoy, said
that the ground around the place wasn't made by nature, but was made by man's labour.
His Lordship—Probably.

When he examined the plot in July, 1045, witness said he found just a little grass field and unless the briars referred to were rooted out they should have been sprouting then, and he saw no such fining.
