Readers confronted with a multi-tude of conflicting theories and false scales of values must return to sound fundamental doctrine as taught by the scholastics and their modern exponents. From such serene and sane heights a balanced perspective will be obtained which will greatly facilitate the formation of a true scale of values in cultural and social matters.

SEED PRODUCTION AREA. As a result of Orders which have been made by the Minister for Agriculture the area already declared to be a seed production area in respect of seeds of sugar beet is being extended as from the 1st January, 1946. The existing seed production area comprises portions of Counties Cork, Kerry, Limerick, Tipperary and Waterford. The enlarged area will include those portions of Counties. include those portions of Counties Cork and Kerry at present excluded Waterford. The eastern boundary of the new area will be a line running roughly from Thurles through Fethard and Clonmel to the sea coast

The production of mangel or sugar mangel seeds will not be permitted in the area declared to be a seed production area in respect of seeds of sugar beet. The prohibition is intended to prevent cross-fertilisation between seed crops of sugar beet and seed crops of mangels or sugar mangels which would render impossible the production of satisfactory seeds
