The dietary scale drawn up for the inmates of the Dungarvan County Home was subjected to severe criticism by the members of Waterford Board of Assistance—Mr P. Caulfield (Chairman) presiding—at the usual monthly meeting at the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on Monday.

The matter was raised by Senator Butler at the last meeting of the Board, when he asked the Secretary

Board, when he asked the Secretary to have the dietary scale for the next meeting. In compliance with Senator Butler's request, the Secretary gave the information required.

The scale provides for each inmate

3 ozs. of corned beef (formerly bacon, which is not available now) on Sundays and Thursdays; potatoes on Sundays, Tuesdays and Thursdays; soup or milk and bread on Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays; bread, sweet or boiled rice (not available now) on Fridays. Senator Butler—That is the midday meal? day meal?

Secretary-Yes. Senator Butler-I think it is shocking. I won't say anything else, only that it is shocking. Mr. Kyne-When was it drawn up? Is it correct to say it hasn't been anged since 1917?

Mr. Kyne—My information is that t was at that time, when we were were in the throes of a world war. Provision had to be made for her fighting forces, but now in 1945, under our own rule, the position is slightly worse. The mystery is: How have these people lived? SHOCKING FARE.

Senator Butler—It is a shocking fare to give any unfortunate people.

Mr. Kyne said he visited the Co. Home on 23rd August. The Matron told him that they had not given potatoes to them for months, because they hadn't them.
