POSITION REVIEWED BY U.D.C. SHORTAGE COMPLAINTS.

The position of the water supply in Dungarvan was under review at the meeting of the Urban District Council last Friday night.

Complaints were made of shortages in different places particularly Cathal Brugha Place. Reference was made to the main from Deelish, it being to the main from Deelish, it being suggested that this pipe was partially choked and would want cleaning.

Arising from the minutes, Mr. Kyne referred to the complaints he made at the last meeting regarding the water supply at Cathal Brugha Place and the report of the engineer on the matter, and said that he would not agree that the supply could be not agree that the supply could be called "reasonably good." Since he had reported on the shortage to a number of houses in this area he had visited other houses and found the same position in these also. He wished to know how it was that there was water on one day and none on

other days.

The Acting Borough Surveyor said that Cathal Brugha Place was elevated and naturally the water pressure was weak there. The shortage was due to insufficient pressure. The pressure at the Causeway was 22lbs. and that was ridiculeus. He could not do anything about it until the recommendations made by him and other engineers were carshowed wonderful skill and spirit.
