DOUBLE FOR MOUNT SION

THRILLING TUSSELS AT DUNGARVAN.
S.H. Mount Sion, 3-8; Dungarvan, 2-5
M.H.—Mt. Sion, 4-5; Cappoquin, 4-2.

Mount Sion brought off the double at the Gaelic Field, Dungarvan, on last Sunday when their senior and minor hurlers defeated Dungarvan and Cappoquin, respectively, in the county finals. Both games were productive of good clean hurling, the senior match being, in the opinion of many of the spectators, one of the best seen at the Dungarvan venue for a number of years.

The reasons for Dungarvan's failure may be attributed to lack of combination and very poor positional sense. The latter defect was very noticeable in the full-back line, where a glaring example was seen in the first half when three backs standing a few paces in front of each other failed to stop Mount Sion's second goal. It was not a very difficult shot to stop and if it had been left to the goal-keeper it would undoubtedly have been saved. The goalie cannot be held responsible for this rather soft score. The half-back line was brilliant with J. Goode and Landers starring.

The chief idea underlying the tactics of the forwards was, apparently, every man for himself. There seemed to be a complete absence of any attempt at combination at all. There was also the old, old fault of trying to lift the ball though tackled by two or three of the opposition—a ridiculous and foolhardy undertaking.

Mount Sion's Methods.
The winners, on the other hand, combined better and stuck well to their allotted positions. The forwards did not get as many chances as the home forwards but what they got they did not allow to fritter away. They seemed to be more sure of themselves and did not keep dilly-dallying with the ball, which cannot be said for the Dungarvan forwards. They were quick to take and passed the ball around to each other, and if a score did not always follow, it was not reflection on their methods.

The back lines were sound without being brilliant and a pleasing feature was their covering up tactics. John Keane was in good form and was a tower of strength.

THE PLAY.
Dungarvan had a wide in the first minute. Mount Sion fouled after the delivery and Barron securing, spent for Dungarvan with a point. J. 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Libraries Committee.

A meeting of the County Waterford Libraries Committee was held in the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on Monday, 15th October. Present: Mrs. G. Moloney, Acting Chairman; Mrs. M. Maher, Miss M. Healy, Messrs. M. F. Walsh, M.C.C.; R. Walsh, T. A. Kyne, M.C.C.; T. Dugan, M.C.C.; M. O'Hara.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and duly signed. The County Librarian reported that a Central Juvenile Library for Dungarvan would be opened very shortly in Mary Street. There could not be a really satisfactory service for Dungarvan until such time as adequate finance was provided for building, staff and stock. The Thomas Davis Centenary had been inaugurated a national day throughout the country and had received official support and recognition from both Central Government and Local Government. The County Librarian was an ardent advocate of public libraries in Ireland. Members of the central and local governing authorities should regard this latter passage in which Davis refers to libraries and show their practical appreciation of what he stood for by inaugurating a national day for full and efficient library service for Ireland.

Mrs. Maher said that it was a matter of rates and that it would be difficult to obtain the necessary amount. The County Librarian stated that in view of the continued expansion of the association and very valuable demands of borrowers it was quite clear that the public wanted a full library service. Therefore the local authority should be merely meeting the expressed desire of the community by providing it.

Mr. T. A. Kyne, speaking of the library service in Dungarvan, stated that the service in Dungarvan was insufficient change of stock, over duplication, and the books were not good (exclusive of the moral aspect). He stated that the latter was not to be agreed with and that though he did not agree with censorship, he had an official censorship and that was sufficient. He maintained that even for the amount of the service in Dungarvan was poor. People wanted up-to-date books.

Replying to Mr. Kyne, the County Librarian said that he quite agreed with the former that the library situation in Dungarvan was bad. Two years ago he took over as Librarian and he had to do a great deal of work to get the library into a proper building, suitably staffed and stocked. The present condition of the Dungarvan library was not a financial restriction aggravated by the war. Just as a commercial firm without sufficient capital could not offer an adequate amount or variety of goods to its customers, so it was with the library. The County Librarian stated that he had drafted a plan for the reorganisation of the library, but he could not do it without a more effort of his imagination and a book stock out of this air without the necessary funds. As regards the library stock, he stated that though he himself would not care for a woman's love story, say, Molly Waring, anybody who did had a right to read it. He did not impose his own literary taste on borrowers. He merely selected books in those domains where the ordinary borrower would be interested. In fact he himself sought advice where there might be a question of a suitable book on engineering or some such subject. He said that while the question of stock was being discussed 200 new fiction were being placed in Dungarvan Centre. This was the first time over a considerable period that it had been possible to add so many owing to war conditions.

Mr. M. O'Hara, B.A., said that he had always found a very good collection of general works in Dungarvan. Miss M. Healy, referring to competition of commercial libraries, said that while the could afford to have the latest and very often expensive books in stock as they recouped their outlay by loan charges in a short time, the County Libraries, being a free rate-supported institution, was not in the same favourable position in this respect.

Mr. R. Walsh stated that there were biographies of unknown people in the Dungarvan stock. Mrs. M. G. Moloney, Acting Chairman, closing the debate, said that they all appreciated Mr. Kyne's frank and fearless criticism. Her own experience, however, of Dungarvan Centre over a long period of years was that the selection of books available, having regard to all the circumstances and limitations, was as good as could be expected.

LISTEN TO THIS

(By "Q"). The 16th of last month marked the centenary of the death of one of Ireland's noblest sons, our loved poet and patriot, Thomas Davis, of whom mention was made here a few weeks ago. And this month, October 19, to be exact, the bicentenary of the death of another gifted son of this green isle of song was celebrated. His name was Jonathan Swift, better known as Dean Swift, of St. Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin.

Davis was only beginning his career—a budding genius you might say—when he was snatched away at the early age of 31; but Swift's greatness was given an opportunity to mature for he lived to be 78. And he passed away then, only because his generous heart ceased to function when worries and troubles beclouded his mind.

Samuel Johnson, one of the very greatest of English scholars, was a contemporary of Swift, and a great admirer of the Dean, said something to the effect that when a genius is born to the world all the dunces throw bricks at him. Perhaps he had Swift in mind, for Swift was not only that, and a great satirist and writer, but an acute humanist and a man of letters as well. He saw things as they really were and his work and labour for their betterment were opposed and derided by the "dunces." I helped to dethrone his reason and hasten his end. His "Gulliver's Travels" has been translated into every living language and will be popular as long as words are spoken. Davis, as a writer and poet, appealed particularly to Ireland; but Swift is more universally recognised to-day, although he died over 200 years ago, or 100 before Davis.

Of Swift, St. Walter Scott said: "He had in his virtues few equals and in his talents no superior."

Though, like Davis, the Dean was of a different belief from the majority of the Irish people, he was loved by all classes and classes. His funeral and the mourning of the people proved that. That applies also to Davis.

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
