AMPLIFICATION AT THE **DUNGARVAN DANCES?**

"PUBLIC WANT IT"

Urban District Council Hears Deputation's Views.

That the dancing public of Dun-garvan want amplification at the Town Hall dances was stated by Mr. P. Ryan, spokesman for deputation representing a number of local dance clubs which came before the Urban Council on last Friday night. The deputation was in connection with the decision of the Manager not to appeal against the decision of the District Court regarding amplifica-tion at dances in the Town Hall. It was also stated that local and outside dance bands would not play

Following a rather lengthy discussion the council decided by a majority vote to recommend to the Manager that an appeal be lodged against the District Justice's order.

Bands Refuse to Play. Mr. Ryan, on behalf of the deputation, said that they were represent-ing a number of local dance clubs and were coming before the council about the question of the tance licence for the Town Hall, for which they understood an appeal had been lodged as regards the hours and the parking of cars. Their main point arking of cars. Their main pe however, was concerned with the question of the amplification, which might have seen in the local papers that Mick Delahunty had refused to take any further engagements and had cancelled future engagements— the National and Commercial Club, the Literary Club and the Show Club dances-because he will not play in the hall without the amplifiers. Mr. Lynch had a letter from Pat Crowley and he said he was not keen on playing in the hall also without fication. As regards the Dungarvan bands, they would ont play at all. It was out of the question for them. They had refused to play at a number of dances for the same reason. The last two dances had been run at a financial loss. This was the first time this had happened in 12 months. The


