LISTEN TO THIS (By "Q.")

When the Faha Amateur Dramatic Society was being organized and their first play rehearsed and produced this year what was said about it by way of "write-up" appeared in the paper. The paper and when young Ed. Power, one of the players closed his eyes to penetrate the erstwhile impenetrable veil of mystery we formed some lines in memoriam as it were. These also appeared and were appreciated, not only by the members of the little dramatic society but by everyone who knew Ed. His father looked upon the article in the light of an eulogy and when he shook my hand and in the broken voice of emotion thanked me, he didn't know that by just that elemental act he was bestowing upon me a precious reward—a recompense to which I'm honestly unaccustomed—and it gave me a sort of thrill. After all, it's the simple things—the things that have no monetary value—that are priceless. Anyhow, this led to these "Listen to This" articles.

The first dealt with names and nicknames, specifically the popular Co. Waterford name, Power. The reason of that, perhaps, was my personal acquaintance with the boy who passed away bore that name. The article interested not only the Power family in general but others as well for the nearly every one—Irish and English for that matter—is descended from "the proud invader" if not on the mother's side. Well, we've been asked, both orally and by mail, to write further on the subject of names. Indeed, only a few days ago I was handed me at the "Observer" Office. It had been there for some time and the reason I received it rather belatedly was because I was only occasionally, Why call? Why not post my articles, instead, did you say? Well, I do post them sometimes. But I post in one of a whole just to have a look around, you know—ahem! Please do not think that I call only on pay days. The very idea! No, I wouldn't want to have the staff think that for a moment, although I do call on pay days. But that's only a coincidence and the coincidence is that I know that, too; otherwise they wouldn't always be so pleased to see me. Why, every time I step in the door, even on pay days, I'm sure of a welcome, a genuine cead mile failte no less, and that statement goes all the way down the line, from the Editor to the office boys. Well, "nuff sed" about it—so let's get to business and tackle those Anglo-Norman names and nicknames now that the subject is again on the tapis, although the column's filling up. But we can go at it again. Now that we said about the Geraldines or Fitzgeralds a few weeks ago applies to many "people with names" that are called "Irish" to-day. Gerald, Harris, Henry, Maurice, Patrick, Simons, Stephen—all Anglo-Norman names. Affix the Fitz to each one and you have the names of the first planters in Stronoburgh, Vernon, etc. If you put a "de" in front of each one the names will be as they were when the names were first planted their feet on Irish soil. And this was when they landed by Hook or by Crook as it is called in the public eye. Waterford and Westford (around Passage) are known. Nicknames? Stronoburgh, who heard the expedition, was surname owners, "the name of the Earl of Pembroke, Richard de Clare. Like nicknames, it is most surprising that the slogans and phrases come into use. In the 12th century when King Henry II of England acceded to the request of Dermot, King of Leinster, to crush Brian O'Ruairc, the Prince of Brehin, it started the firework—the Anglo-Norman invasion. The gentlemen above mentioned set sail for the green shores of Erin. Stormy weather and shallow waters compelled them to make more than one attempt to land. Eventually they found that the only possible way they could get into Ireland was just the way the got in—by Hook or by Crook. And there you have it literally and figuratively. Waterford Committee of Agriculture.

Mr. M. O'Ryan, Vice-Chairman, presided at the monthly meeting of the Waterford Co. Committee of Agriculture at the Courthouse, Dungarvan on last Saturday. Also present: Messrs. D. Coghlan, J. Fives, T. Morrissey, W. Dower, and D. Heskin, T.D., P. O'Shea (Horticulture Instructer). Mr. P. J. O'Sullivan, (Asst. do.); Miss M. M. Mullins (Poultry Instructress) and Mr. D. Hurley, Acting Secretary. The Department wrote approving of the appointments of Messrs. M. O'Sullivan and P. J. O'Sullivan, as instructors in agriculture and horticulture, respectively.

Lime Subsidy Scheme.—A letter from the Department of Agriculture to the Waterford Co. Committee of Agriculture was prepared to recoup to the Committee the actual expenditure (exclusive of administrative expenses) in excess of £400. The letter also stated that tenders be invited immediately for the supply of lime. The Acting Secretary said that the procedure and conditions were the same as last year and that there was a drop of £200.

Mr. O'Ryan, referring to the order made at the last meeting that a flat rate subsidy be given to both mountain and lowland farmers said he did not agree with that. They (the subsidy) had for a long number of years been asking the Department for a subsidy for lime and after a long time they got it. In the past subsidy but now that has been levelled up at the last meeting. He thought that unfair. He would like to see the subsidy increased to the mountain farmers. The application of lime to mountain land would better it and improve it. In the past mountain farmers got a lighter subsidy but now that has been levelled up at the last meeting. He thought that unfair. He would like to see the subsidy increased to the mountain farmers. The application of lime to mountain land would better it and improve it.

Mr. Heskin said that they agreed that the mountain man was not in the same position to grow beet and wheat as the lowland farmer. The wheat also boost it up. Mr. O'Ryan said that in the lowland lime was not produced, much nearer than the mountains and the subsidy was reduced a lot by the cost of carriage. He would suggest an extra sixpence for the mountain man. Mr. Heskin said he was prepared to agree if it would not interfere with the estate. The Acting Secretary said it would be hard to say at the moment what the position would be as it would depend on orders and demand. The Acting Secretary—Another aspect of the question is—who are mountain farmers and who are lowland farmers? I think that has been defined by the Minister. Acting Secretary—But some of the applications that come here have no information to that effect on them. Mr. O'Ryan—The areas are defined by a ministerial order and that is on record. A resolution, rescinding the original resolution granting a flat rate subsidy to both mountain and lowland farmers and increasing the subsidy to the former, was passed.

Cow-Testing Association.—In a letter read by the Acting Secretary the number of cow-testing associations in the county was the same as last year. Mr. Heskin said the cow-testing associations should be encouraged more, if only for the educational view point of the farmer. Mr. O'Ryan referred to the fact that there was no association in his area. Acting Secretary.—An effort was made to run one there but it met with poor success. Mr. Heskin—Do you get annual reports from the associations? Acting Secretary.—The Cow-Testing Institute send a report in which are embodied all the reports. Mr. O'Ryan—It reports were sent from time to time, would that attract the attention of the public? Mr. Heskin—It might. I notice that it is always the custom to discuss the good cow. You often see reports of the good cow but never that of the bad cow. I think the bad cow should be discussed too, and its defects pointed out to the public. Mr. O'Ryan—I think it would help to keep the public interested, to keep it in the public eye. Mr. Dower—It is very hard to do that until the end of the season. Mr. Heskin—You could report progress anyway. Mr. Dower referred to the fact that some areas were more fertile than others with the result that a cow in a good grass area could produce more milk than a cow in an area not so good. He thought a line should be drawn between such areas. There was the Golden Vale and other areas like that. It was agreed that the Acting Secretary write to the different cow-testing associations regarding the question of supplying periodical reports. Kerensko for Brooder-Heaters.—The Department wrote asking for a list of those with brooder-heaters in their possession so as to arrange for paraffin oil supplies. The Acting Secretary said all the necessary information would be supplied. Farm Improvement Scheme.—The Department writes stating that the Committee's resolution regarding purchase of tractors for excavating drains would be considered when up for review. Mr. Heskin—I understand silos can be built now under the scheme. Mr. Heskin—It would be well to bring that to the notice of the public; it would relieve us of financial obligations. Mr. O'Ryan—Are the people who built them always subsidising them? The Acting Secretary—Not all. It depends on the season. This year now was a bad one to fill them. Premiums to Boars.—Applications for premium boars were received from: Mr. Lombard, Drumgullane, Grange; Jas. McCarthy, Ballyduff (existing holder), and John Power, Mambuco, Clone (ditto).

Wheat Growers Association and ask him to give a certain percentage for this county. Some people got the offer and did not want it at all. Mr. Heskin—Nobody is more entitled to it than those who produced grain. Mr. Dower—The position was very bad this year. The wheat offer could not be got. It's a racket. It goes somewhere. A resolution proposed by Mr. Morrissey and seconded by Mr. Heskin, drawing the Department's attention to the matter and requesting that the 80 per cent offer be given to the wheat growers of 1945, was passed. Poultry Stations.—Miss M. M. Mullins, Instructress in poultry-keeping, reported that she had recommended twenty people as holders of poultry stations. There were three new ones and one had been cancelled, leaving a net increase of two. Miss Mullins added that it was very difficult to get the right people for stations. She would like to have forty if she could get suitable people. Replying to Mr. O'Ryan, Miss Mullins said the difficulty was getting people to comply with the conditions. People had not time and this was specialised work. It would be better not to do the work if it was not done right. Fruit Sprayer Application.—Mr. P. Morrissey, Ballycoe, applied for a fruit sprayer. The Acting Secretary said that £50 had been set aside for a sprayer. Mr. O'Shea (Instructor in Horticulture) said that the cost of one was £180 and the grant 50 per cent. Mr. Dower—I think it would be money well spent. Mr. Heskin—Can you exceed that? Mr. O'Shea said that the machines had come back on to the markets at an increased price, the cost of one would be very well spent. There was about £250 set aside for orchards and the position was that half of that might not be spent. He would suggest to the committee that the machine be purchased. The application was granted. Wool Clip Price Resolution.—The Galway Committee of Agriculture and the Limerick Committee of Agriculture wrote stating that they had adopted the resolution regarding the maximum price for the 1945 wool clip. Condition of Roads.—Mr. Heskin drew attention to the hardship on horses drawing beet to the stations in Dungarvan and Cappoquin caused by the tar roads. He would suggest that the Acting Co. Surveyor be asked to put gravel on them. Mr. O'Ryan said that for years he had been hammering away at this complaint. On the high road leading to Cappoquin sand had been spread. He suggested to the late Mr. Bowen years ago that sand should be scattered on the roads every fortnight. "The farmers," said Mr. O'Ryan, "should take a firm stand on this. They should not be subjected to these conditions. The Co. Council workmen have been away from the road, producing turf for which there is no demand. I say again, the farmers should stand up to this. If they say they will not produce wheat or beet until this grievance is remedied they will listen to them. The farmers should not get anything unless he stands up to it." A resolution, proposed by Mr. Fives and seconded by Mr. Heskin, calling the attention of the Acting Co. Surveyor to the grievance and asking that it be remedied, was passed.
