Companion Describes Accident.

Thomas Gough, farmer, a neighbour of the deceased, residing at aha, said he knew the deceased and December 2nd, witness attended a football match in Dungaryan. 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

O'Gorman, said—Seven years ago to the very month, Youghal Bridge was closed to vehicular traffic of over 2½ tons. Now the world has seen many changes since that time and men have given of their all to assert their rights. We, in this town have seen the man strength of the world sapped away, and here at our own very doorsteps we have seen the slow canker of apparent apathy eating into the com-mercial life of our town, due to the restrictions placed on the free flow of traffic over this main artery. one realised when the bridge was first condemned as unsafe for loads over a certain tonnage that it was bound to have a militating effect on the prosperity of our town. We little hought then that seven years would pass and that no move would have been made by those in authority to have the bridge restored or a new one erected. No blame can be laid on our shoulders, for from the very first moment we, whose duty it was, did our very best to ensure that such a state of affairs would not last one noment longer than was necessary.
