INSPECTOR'S OPINION QUOTED AT U.D.C. MEETING.

The opinion of a turf inspector who examined turf as sold in Dungarvan was quoted at the meeting of the Dungarvan Urban District Council on last Friday. It was stated that he described the turf as "impossible to light."

He also said: "If you put it on a lighted fire it would put it out! And the curious part of it was that the sod he had in his hand, he took out of the basket near the fire in his office. That is the quality of the turf we are getting here."

INSPECTOR'S FUNCTIONS. Mr. Clancy—What powers has the inspector? What functions has he?
Mr. Clancy—None, so he has to get good turf.

"GREATEST RACKET EVER KNOWN."

Chairman—The only thing is to get a few cwt. of coal (laughter).
Mr. Clancy—That would settle the question. We'd bless the day we see it again.

TRAP AND LORRY COLLIDE

Bohannon Farmer's Fatal Injuries.

Inquest Adjourned.

A very sad tragedy occurred near Garrynagrath (Corked) Bridge, Co. Wick, on last Monday night, resulting in the death of a 71 years old farmer, named John Bohannon (senior), Ballydwan West, Wick.

It appears that the deceased was driving home in his pony and trap and having passed the bridge, he became involved in a collision with a lorry, the property of the Dungarvan Co-Op. Creameries. He was thrown from the trap to the ground, sustaining a head injury.

A fortunate coincidence, Dr. D. T. McCarthy, Abbeystead, happened to pass by the scene a short time after the collision, and after consulting medical aid, brought the injured man to Dungarvan Hospital where he died about 6.30 on Tuesday morning.

"A SEVERE FALL."
Dr. D. T. McCarthy said he arrived at the scene near the Crooked Bridge, Clontarf, at about 6.45 p.m. on Dec. 17. The deceased was lying on the side of the road, attended by two young ladies. He was very collapsed and moaning and unconscious. With difficulty he was taken to the hospital (witness) car and immediately conveyed him to the hospital. Witness examined him in the hospital.

PROGRESS OF FARM WORK.
On the farm we found a good deal of work has already been done within a short space of time, and every effort is being made towards putting the land back into cultivation. We feel it will take some time before the soil is restored to fertility and would suggest the purchase of 80 barrels of lime for use as a fertiliser.

RECOMMENDATIONS.
(1) Purchase of three ten gallon electric boilers which are under-stand available at a cost of £8 14s each. This will ensure a supply of hot water at all times. (2) Purchase of electric bread cutter and potato peeler. (3) Purchase of three large sinks with draining boards, these to be erected in yard off kitchen. This portion of yard to be enclosed so as to ensure protection of staff from weather and to make it more comfortable to work in. (4) Purchase of cold room insulation, but we suggest waiting a few months as new and modern equipment may be on the market. (5) Purchase of Aga Cooker which we believe would pay for itself in a short time. This would make available a variety of cooking which is not possible under present conditions. (6) Purchase of iron bars for farm and other other furniture, that may be necessary.

DEY TURF GOOD INVESTMENT.
Mr. Clancy—I would not agree that it is too uneconomical.
Chairman—It is costing 14/- or 15/- a week.
Mr. Clancy—It helped to relieve the period when we could not get coal.
Chairman—We are sure you will have to continue with the turf for a while longer.
Mr. Clancy—Despite what has been said, I will hold that turf—that is good, dry turf—is a good investment. I know cases where people got dry turf and others wet turf. That is the fact. I do know that the poor people are getting wet turf, and that is not fair either. Is there an order of the Government that if percentage of wet turf had to return it, remember it was stated in the "Irish Press."

Co. Home Conditions Improved

Visiting Committee's Report.

FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS SUGGESTED.

The report of the Visiting Committee, who inspected conditions in the Dungarvan Co. Home on December 13th, was read at the monthly meeting of the Waterford Board of Assistance (Mr. P. Caulfield, Chairman, presiding) at the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on Monday last.

The report showed that conditions had improved very much, and that was favourably commented on by the members. The Visiting Committee comprised Messrs. M. Morrissey, T.D., and Mr. Continuing. Mr. Kyne made reference to a remark made by the Secretary regarding a 1926 scale at the last meeting and said he presumed that the Secretary would have it for them now. In the 1917 scale the inmates got meat and vegetables on a certain number of days only. He felt that they should get them every day. He still held that there was no period that it was not economical not to give them. The fact remained that there was room for criticism and the report before them was justification for that criticism.

MODERN COOKING EQUIPMENT NEEDED.
It is also out of the question to have a variety of cooking as this range is incapable of cooking a roast. Breakfast is often delayed and no hot water is available due to the difficulty of raising steam in the boilers. Modern equipment should be made available for the cutting of bread and peeling of potatoes.

WANT OF WASH-UP FACILITIES.
Mr. Morrissey said that No. 3 was important too. It wasn't right to have the staff doing the wash-up in the open. This should be enclosed and proper facilities like sinks made available.
Mr. Kyne said he agreed with the recommendations in the report. He referred to the difficulties in the kitchen and said the Matron had a big job as it was to feed them all without these.

CRITICISM JUSTIFIED.

Mr. Kyne said that when he and Senator Butler made their report things were not the same as they were now. Certainly, there was a complete absence of vegetables and potatoes and the inmates were only getting bread and milk. That was not good enough.

"CRYING NEEDED FOR COOKER."
Mr. Morrissey—There is a crying need for a cooker and I think the ideal one would be an Aga Cooker. Secretary—That is also in the hands of the engineers.
Mr. Morrissey, continuing, said the recommendation of No. 1 was very necessary and the cost was small. In the mornings it would be a great benefit. It would ensure that hot water would be available at all times.

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1924 DIET SCALE.

Regarding the request made at the last meeting for the scale referred to in a letter from the Department, the Secretary said the following was the scale (1924): Sunday and Thursday, 6ozs. bacon, 1 1/2 lbs. potatoes, 1 lb. vegetables; Monday and Saturday, 6ozs. beef, 1 1/2 lbs. potatoes, 1 lb. vegetables; Tuesday, pint of Irish stew, 1 1/2 lbs. potatoes or 6ozs. of bread. Wednesday, 6ozs. mutton, 1 1/2 lbs. of potatoes or 7 ozs. bread; Friday, 1 lb. of potatoes, 1 egg, pint of milk.

OLD BOARD BLAMED.
Mr. Kyne said he was afraid the guilt lay with the then Board. He asked if there had been any discussion at the meeting.
