DISCUSSIONS AT DUNGARVAN U.D.C.

Post-War Schemes. INSPECTION OF COUNCIL'S HOUSES RECOMMENDED.

Mr. T. McCarthy, chairman, presided at the meeting of the Dungarvan Urban District Council on last Friday. Also present—Messrs. L. Veale, E. K. Morrissey, T.D., N. Kelly, M. Clancy, S. J. Moynihan, Manager; J. Ormond, Acting Borough Surveyor, and M. O'Meara, Acting Town Clerk.

In his report on the progress of general works during the year, the Acting Borough Surveyor stated that they had progressed satisfactorily, though more could be done if funds were available. Housing repairs had again been considerable during the past year.

Some of which (he referred to) would have been done with a little more care on the part of the tenants. This work would have to be redone considerably for the remainder of the year owing to insufficient moneys.

"I would again recommend," he continued, "a regular inspection of the council's houses, by the rent collectors, and reports of how they are kept."

Continuing, the report stated that a number of special works were carried out during the year by order of the council for which no provision was made in the estimates. These involved a considerable expenditure.

Water supply—Dealing with the water supply, the report stated the position has not been alleviated. Every possible attempt had been made to improve the situation with little success. Enquiries were being made as to the cost of cleaning the main from Deane to town and he expected some information on this shortly.

Mr. Morrissey referred to the circular re preference for ex-army men for work and asked the Acting Borough Surveyor if he kept that in mind when employing the men at Xmas.

The Acting Borough Surveyor said he had it in mind. The employment of men on the scheme had been discussed with Mr. Kynce. The names had been got through the exchange. To Mr. Clancy, the Acting Borough Surveyor said a list of names was kept at Exchanges and the first names on the list were taken.

Mr. Morrissey said it was only right and fair that men with big families should get preference. Mr. O'Meara said that was done in all schemes.

Planning Expert—Regarding the appointment of a town planning expert, the Manager said it was a matter for the council and they would advise for one.

Mr. Clancy said it would be money well spent. Town planning was a more important thing than he thought. To rehouse poor people, and with the end in view they should ensure that they get houses at low rent. There was no reason why they should pay higher rents. He was sure a town planning expert could go into it with the Acting Borough Surveyor.

Replying to Mr. Morrissey, the Manager said the fee would be over £200.

Mr. Clancy said that materials were coming into the country now and there was a lot of work to be done acquiring sites, etc. For that reason he thought that they should get on with it.

Ardmore District Court

At the Ardmore District Court on Monday, 17th December, 1945, before Judge Justice Fitzgerald, the summons of Mary McGrath, of Lisgriffin, Aghish, for maintenance against her husband, Wm. McGrath, of Drumsilig, was heard.

The Justice decided to hear the case and Mrs. McGrath gave evidence on oath that she was married to William McGrath on the 26th November, 1936, at Ballinacree Church by Fr. Gleeson, the Parish Priest, the witnesses being Patrick Foley and Kathleen Foley and she produced a certificate of their marriage for inspection by the Court.

The Justice having heard the foregoing evidence made an order for payment of 30/- per week maintenance to commence on 24th December 1945, together with a sum of £4-4s. to cover plaintiff's costs.
